## Baptists Slate Weekly TV Show

The Southern Baptist Radio Commission has been invited by the National Broadcasting Company to televise a program on "Frontiers of Faith" January 27. This is a thirty-minute broadcast, and is a regular weekly feature of the NBC television network.

Charles Wellborn, Baptist Hour radio speaker, will give the message, "Design for Living." Music will be supplied by the choir of the Calvary Baptist Church in New York City, under the direction of Charles Ennis. Dr. John S. Wimlish, pastor of the church, will give the opening prayer. Frank Boggs, Baptist Hour soloist, will also be featured. The program will originate in New York.

The live broadcast of this program will be on the NBC television network January 27. Most of the station will carry it at that time, but a few will carry it later by kinescope film. Contact your nearest NBC station for their exact time of broadcast.

This will be the first network telecast produced by the Radio Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention. Dr. R. E. Lewis, director of the Commission, has expressed the hope that this broadcast will mark the beginning of active participation in the television field by Southern Baptists.
