"The author tells us," said Mrs. Kay, "that the fascinating account of how red-headed James (Buck) Duke rose from a tobacco peddler to millionaire through cigarette manufacturing is a more colorful story than that of his contemporaries John D. Rockefeller who did the same in oil, or Andrew Carnegie who did the same with steel."

The reviewer pointed out that

the fortunes of the Duke family are forever interwoven into the economic life of Piedmont North Carolina. Emphasis was given particularly to the many philanthropies made by James B. Mary and Ben Duke, the children of Washington Duke, with the first of the most generous donor of Trinity College now Duke University.

Mrs. McKay also discussed how Dr. John C. Kilgo, former president of Trinity College and Dr. W. P. Few of Durham were responsible for interesting "Buck" Duke in educational and church philanthropies.

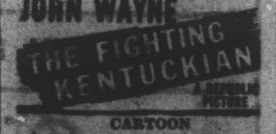
