

New Sanitary Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE TO PROMOTE SANITARY CONDITIONS IN THE TOWN OF DUNN BY PROVIDING PROPER STORAGE AND HANDLING OF ALL GARBAGE, RUBBISH AND WASTE MATTER.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF DUNN:

SECTION I. That for the purpose of this Ordinance the following definitions shall apply unless the content clearly indicates another meaning or unless elsewhere expressly stated.

A. The term "garbage" shall mean every accumulation of animal or vegetable food-stuff that affords the preparation, consumption, dealing-in, or storage of meat, fish, fowl, fruit or vegetables including the cans, containers or wrappers.

B. The term "rubbish" shall mean printed matter, paper, paperboard, pasteboard boxes, rag, straw, and all other combustible material not included under the term "garbage."

C. The term "refuse" shall mean and include any waste product which is composed of such materials as garbage, sweepings, trash, litter, animal matter from kitchens, dining rooms, markets, food establishments or other places dealing in or handling meat, fowl, fruits, grain, shrub trimmings, grass clippings, brick, plaster, or other waste matter resulting from the demolition, alteration or construction of buildings, accumulated waste ma-

terials, cans, containers, tires, junk or other substance which may be a nuisance.

D. The term "waste matter" shall mean waste material composed of soil, gravel, stone, bricks, plaster, crockery, glass, ashes, cinders, metals and all other non-combustible materials which have been discarded or is to be discarded.

E. The term "collector" shall mean the Town of Dunn, North Carolina, or employees or agents thereof who are engaged in the collection or transportation of rubbish, garbage, or waste matter in any part of the Town of Dunn.

SECTION II. REFUSE REQUIRED TO BE PROMPTLY REMOVED. No refuse that has become decayed or that shall otherwise be a menace to health or cleanliness shall be allowed to remain in any business establishment, dwelling house, or on any premises longer than shall be reasonably necessary to remove and deposit the same in containers of the type as provided by this Ordinance.

SECTION III. DEPOSIT OF REFUSE IN PUBLIC PLACES OR ON PRIVATE PROPERTY. No person shall throw, place, or deposit any refuse in any street, alley, gutter, or public way, or throw or deposit the same in or upon premises or vacant lot or in any water or open ditch, or store or keep the same, except in containers as provided by this Ordinance.

SECTION IV. RODENT CONTROL. No person shall store, deposit, or keep refuse in any place or in any manner where rodents can have access to or feed thereon, or can use such refuse as harborage, nest, or breeding place.

SECTION V. INCINERATION. No person shall burn garbage, or rubbish at any place, or in any manner violating a provision of the sanitary code or likely to create a health or property hazard or a nuisance.

A. Under no circumstance shall any material causing excessive smoke, liberating a toxic substance on combustion, or producing a noxious odor likely to affect the occupant or any premises, be burned except under conditions approved by the Fire Chief or a member of the Fire Department designated by ordinance of the Board of Commissioners.

B. The occasional burning of small quantities of dry rubbish, paper, paste board boxes brush, dry leaves, and similar materials on private premises under controlled conditions shall be acceptable provided the above conditions are complied with in all other respects.

1. Such burning shall be in metal or heavy wire basket containers or steel drums which shall meet the specifications defined by the Fire Chief or the representative of the

Fire Department designated by Ordinance of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Dunn for that purpose.

SECTION VI. CONSTRUCTION OR DEMOLITION OF BUILDINGS. Every person, building contractor, or sub-contractor engaged in the construction, repair, or demolition of any building or structure or part thereof, shall remove and dispose of, in an authorized manner, from any street, alley, gutter, park, sidewalk, curbing, curb space, any public way, or any premises not owned by him all waste matter or rubbish deposited thereon in connection with that portion of the repair, construction or demolition work under his special or general supervision.

A. Such refuse, waste matter and rubbish shall be cleaned up, removed, and disposed of in a sanitary manner within seven days of the final cessation of work on such building or structure unless specifically authorized by the Building Inspector or Superintendent of Sanitation.

B. Such waste matter and rubbish shall not be placed on the sidewalk for town trucks to move, but shall be moved by the contractor or sub-contractor who caused the same to be formed.

SECTION VII. LAND. No person, owner, agent or occupant of a lot or premises whereon a building of any kind may exist or of a vacant lot shall allow any collection of garbage, rubbish, waste matter, or filth of any description to remain on such lot or premises after being notified by the Superintendent of Sanitation to remove the same.

SECTION VIII. STANDARDS FOR THE ACCUMULATION OF REFUSE. The following standards and requirements are established as a minimum for the sanitary accumulation and storage of refuse pending its removal by the collectors of the Town of Dunn.

A. OCCUPANTS IN CHARGE OF BUSINESS BUILDINGS.
1. Occupants of business buildings shall store and keep stored all refuse or garbage accumulating in said building or on its premises in metal receptacles which shall completely confine such refuse or garbage pending its removal.

EXCEPTIONS: Business firms having large volumes of cardboard boxes will cut apart, straighten out, crush or stack such boxes into compact packages or bundles and secure with binding material such as string or cord so that such bundles or packages will remain compactly bound to allow for easy handling in collecting.

2. The occupant of any business establishment will provide at his own expense the number of approved containers required to contain the accumulated refuse or other waste material resulting from his business operations.

3. The lid must be chained or tied with a rope with a detachable fastener (such as a bridle snap) to the container so that the lid will not be lost or blown away or otherwise destroyed. Where lids have been previously lost, damaged, or destroyed, they are to be replaced with appropriate metal or wooden lids.

4. Portable metal receptacles of standard galvanized, water tight construction with tight-fitting cov-

ers and handles or balls are required. The size of the receptacle shall not be less than 10 gallons nor more than 33 gallons capacity. Receptacles not complying with the foregoing regulations, such as wooden or paper barrels, tubs, paint buckets, tanks, lard cans, or of such nature are hereby prohibited. Defective receptacles must be replaced immediately.

5. It shall be unlawful to place on the streets, sidewalks, alleys, or other public thoroughfares in the Town of Dunn in the fire district any cardboard boxes, paper, wooden crates, debris, or other packing materials, except that such materials be placed in approved containers. Such containers must be of such quantity and size to hold at least one day's accumulation of rubbish or refuse. The occupant shall be responsible for furnishing the necessary containers and complying with the ordinance as to their proper use.

6. Trash or debris resulting from sweeping or cleaning the floors of such business establishments must be picked up by appropriate methods and placed in approved containers. To sweep such trash onto the sidewalk, gutter, or street is hereby prohibited.

7. Owner must place his container or containers at the nearest designated location indicated for garbage pickup station on or before the hour designated for pickup at that particular station.

B. HOUSEHOLDERS:
1. The occupant of any house, apartment, or part of a house used as a separate place of abode shall cause all garbage collected therein or arising from the use thereof to be placed in water-tight, rodent-proof and dog-proof receptacles of the type specified by this ordinance.

2. Occupants must furnish as many approved receptacles as needed to hold at least one (1) week's accumulation of garbage.

3. Receptacles must have well fitting lids so as to make them rain-proof. The lids are to be chained, or tied with ropes to metal or wooden stakes higher than the container so that the lids will not blow away from the area and be lost or destroyed. Where lids have been previously lost, damaged or destroyed they are to be replaced with appropriate metal or wooden lids.

4. Occupants shall take every opportunity to put wet garbage from the kitchen in paper sacks or wrap in newspapers and tie the same with string so as to facilitate easier handling and emptying of the garbage containers.

5. Occupants are not to place more refuse than can be contained in the number of approved receptacles available. Such materials as tree branches, shrubbery trimmings, box crates, or other refuse of wood must be sawed up, broken up, or crushed into such small pieces as will go into the available containers. If such materials will not go into available containers, then the responsibility for their removal lies with the owner or occupant and not with the Town of Dunn or any department thereunder.

6. Receptacles must be placed in approved types of metal, wooden, concrete or other type of racks so that they may not be turned over

by dogs. Otherwise receptacles must be placed in approved underground containers as sold by certain manufacturers so that they become dog-proof to the extent that dogs cannot molest the contents therein.

7. Turned over receptacles are the responsibility of the owner or occupant to replace refuse back in the container and not the responsibility of the collectors of the Town of Dunn.

SECTION IX. Any person, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof be fined \$25.00 or imprisoned for ten days; and each day upon which violations accrue shall be a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION X. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION XI. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect sixty (60) days from January 22, 1952.

Motion by Mr. Brace and seconded by Mr. Bass that the foregoing ordinance be adopted. Motion carried by a unanimous vote. Adopted January 21, 1952. Jan. 30-Feb. 6-13-30-Mar. 5-9
