CORDINANCE TO PROMOTE SINGULARY CONDITIONS IN THE TOWN OF DUNN BY COVIDING PROPER STORAGE AND HANDLING OF ALL GABBAGE, RUBBISH AND WASTE MATTER.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF HE TOWN OF DUNN:

SECTION I That for the purse of this Ordinance the following definitions shall apoly unless the content clearly indicates anher meaning or unless elsewhere preselv stated.

A The term "garbage" shall any part of the Town of Dunn.

A. The term "garbage" shall mean every accumulation of animal or vegetable food-ctoff that attends the preparation consumption, denime in; or storage of meats, fish fowl, fruit or vegetable food-ctoff that attends the preparation consumption, denime in; or storage of meats, fish fowl, fruit or vegetable food-ctoff that shall otherwise be a menace to health, or cleanliness that printed matter, naner, paperhoard, pasteboard boxes, ray staw, and all other combustible material, not included under the material, not included under the first term "refuse" shall mean dinclude any waste product which is composed of such materials as garbage, sweepings, trashitter, animal matter from kitchensthing froms, markets, food establishments or other places dealing to the first places dealing to the first places of the type as provided by this Ordinance.

SECTION III. DEPOSIT OF REFUSE IN PUBLIC PLACES OR ON PRIVATE PROPERTY. No person shall throw, place, or deposit any refuse in any street, alley, gutter, or public way, or throw or deposit the same in or upon premises or vacant lot or in any water or open ditches, or store or deposit containers as provided by this Ordinance.
