

Arrest Of Klansmen Ends Terror Reign

WHITEVILLE, N. C. (AP) — State and local officials said today the arrest of 10 former Ku Klux Klansmen on kidnapping charges has ended a reign of terror in this area. "I think the whole town of Fair Bluff is relieved," said Columbus County Sheriff H. Hugh Nance. "The Klan was developing a reign of terror, for which we have no place in North Carolina," commented Gov. Kerr Scott. "I think people are pretty happy about it (the arrests)."

"It's just like being able to breathe again," said Sam Scott, Fair Bluff merchant. The nightriders were charged with kidnapping and flogging Mrs. Dorothy Martin, 27, and Ben Grainer, 40, of Fair Bluff on Oct. 8. "I plan to prosecute them to the fullest extent and at the earliest possible date," said U. S. Dist. Attorney Charles P. Green in Fayetteville.

The 10, including four officials of the now defunct Fair Bluff Klavern, allegedly took their victims across the state line into South Carolina and inflicted bodily injury. Green said: "In all probability" the accused men would be prosecuted through regular channels, although a blue-ribbon federal grand jury will be convened Thursday in Raleigh with power to indict. The men were freed on bonds of \$5,000 each and hearings were set before U. S. Commissioner T. L. Hon in Fayetteville Feb. 26 and 27.

The FBI identified the men as Early L. Brooks, 44, Fair Bluff constable and exalted cyclops (president) of the disbanded klavern; his son, Bobby Brooks, 19, klavern lecturer; Ross Enzor, 32, klavern (vice president); L. C. Worley, 25, ligrap (secretary) of Cerro Gordo, N. C.; Bob Hayes, 38, Fair Bluff; Pittman Foy Strickland, 29, Cerro Gordo; George Miller, 19, and his brother, Sherwood Miller, 26, both of Cerro Gordo; Steve Edmond, 26, Fair Bluff, and Horace Strickland, a Columbus County deputy sheriff.
