Game Of Polo Moves Inside; Advisor Predicts New Enthusiasm This Year

CHICAGO—(AP)—A polo enthusiast for 48 years believes the game will regain its pre-depression popularity because it has moved indoors.

Alfon E. Bahr, polo player and coach since he joined a National Guard cavalry troop at the age of 16, suggested that the National Polo League, with seven teams extending from Milwaukee to New York, could bring about popular acclaim for the game again.

"It's a much better game indoors than outside," he said. "A smaller field, only three men on a side, and easier to see and follow. They play the game directly in front of the fans on a field only 350 or 400 feet long and 200 feet wide. Outside it's 450 by 900. And there's much more crashing, more roughness inside."

Bahr, treasurer of the polo league since its inception two years ago, believes that the fans are beginning to support the game already.

"Last year," he said, "we'd draw 1,800 or 2,000 for games, and this year we had 2,500 the first night we played."

It was gratifying to the insurance executive who had to give up the game at the age of 44 because he was "too old."

Knightdale Claims Equal For Welcome

CHAPEL HILL, N. C., FEB. 27—The good basketball fans of Davidson County who are calling Welcome High School one of the top Class A teams in the state and Welcome's Jimmy Jordan "the best player in the state" would get a few arguments from Wake County's basketball faithful.

People in Wake County marvel each week at the antics of Knightdale High School, a team that has rushed through its schedule as if it were driving to the nearest fire. And the Wake fans also put up a few individuals on their "best" lists.

They speak of Henry Bowers in words of praise. Son of Principal H. C. Bowers, young Henry has averaged some 23 points per game. In addition to being the leading scorer on the team, Bowers excels in defensive play, particularly in the rebound department.

And here is the most amazing part of the whole story—he's just a sophomore, a 6-foot-3 sophomore at that. He does most of his scoring from the forward position.

ANOTHER 26 POINTER

Just behind Bowers, Knightdale offers Captain Robert Lassiter, a 5-foot-8 senior guard, who has averaged 20 points a game. Lassiter makes up in speed and drive what he lacks in height. Rounding out the starting five are center John Gay, forward James Pope and guard Aubrey Edwards. Edwards' brilliant defensive work has been largely responsible for the low scores of Knightdale's opponents.

In the first 22 games this year the Knightdale lads scored a total of 1,654 points, while the opponents have tallied 1,046 points. As of this writing, no team has come within 10 points of beating the Wake County flashes.
