

Church Not A Drive-In, Man Faces Charges

A sudden urge to go to church resulted in multiple charges against John O. Kelly, a Fort Bragg soldier, Kelly attempted to go to this particular church with his car, and the church was not one of the drive-in variety.

Officers who investigated determined that Kelly, who was proceeding along the Dunn truck lane, started to make a left turn. He failed to complete the turn, however, and instead drove up the front steps of the Dunn Presbyterian Church.

The car was badly damaged, one of the passengers, Edna Wilkerson suffered lacerations of the mouth and shock and some damage was done to the church edifice. Two other passengers, John T. Leftwich and Elaine Wilkerson were uninjured. The girls live in Fayetteville.

Kelly was booked on charges of drunken driving, careless and reckless driving, having no operators license and damage to the

church property. Leftwich was booked on but one charge, public drunkenness. In City Court Monday Leftwich

testified that he and his companion had but one "bourbon cocktail" at a place called the Birdland Club, and denied that the pair were intoxicated.

"What did you run all up and down those church steps for?" Judge H. Paul Strickland asked. He said he had conferred with church officials and the damage to the building amounted to \$75. Kelly drew a sentence of six months, suspended on payment of \$150 and costs plus an additional \$75 for the damage to the church property. Leftwich was taxed costs with prayer for judgment continued six months.
