stock locally. This was like pulling teeth. Local businessmen just did not want to invest in the islands.

MEMORIAL IN HEARTS OF MEN
After father left the Virgin Islands in 1955 he became public housing administrator under PWA. That was long before the Taft Public Housing Act and it took a lot of pioneering to put slum clearance across. In California, for instance, a law banned any help from federal funds for public housing, and father undertook to persuade the legislature to change the law.

After a month of shuffling between Sacramento and San Francisco, he succeeded. The law was revoked. A few days later, father died. A letter he left asked that no marker be placed on his grave. He wanted only to be remembered in the hearts of men. So his ashes were scattered off the Golden Gate. But today, off the blue waters of the Virgin Islands, the first public housing project. And I know nothing would have pleased him more than to have these buildings for the humble and the poor named the Paul M. Pearson Gardens, as a memorial to him and the people he tried to help.

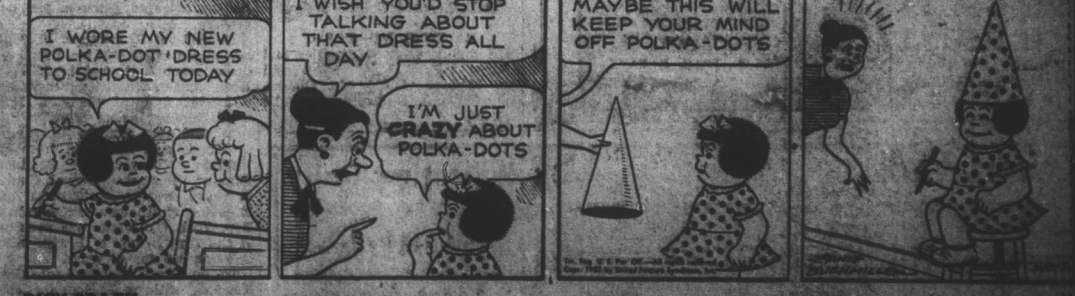
