

# Hoey Honored By Citizens

WASHINGTON — The parchment scroll presented to Senator Clyde H. Hoey in Raleigh last night came as a complete surprise to him, although every other Democrat in the Senate had known about it for days.

The scroll was presented to Hoey at the annual dinner of the North Carolina Citizens Association, and bore the signatures of Vice President Alben Barkley and all of the Democratic members of the Senate except Hoey himself.

The scroll, attesting the high regard in which Hoey is held by his colleagues, was presented in connection with the Senator's selection by the Association as North Carolina's representative to the nation.

It cited Hoey's "acknowledged course of his convictions," his "unselfish devotion to duty," and his "willingness to be spent as a servant of the people."

One of the signers, Senator Spenser L. Holland (D. Fla.) made the presentation.
