

### TEA AND TOPICS CLUB HEARS MRS. ANDERSON IN LILLINGTON

Lillington's Tea and Topics Club, a study group of 14 women, presented Mrs. Roy N. Anderson of Raleigh as guest speaker when the club entertained around 80 visitors at its annual guest meeting Friday afternoon at the Community Center.

Mrs. Anderson, wife of an N. C. State College professor, last summer, accompanied by her husband, their two sons, their teenage daughter and her fiancé visited a number of European countries. She sketched briefly highlights from the three month trip and presented color slides that she made in Europe.

Mrs. Anderson's selection of pictures was notable for unusual scenes from Norway, Sweden and Denmark, particularly the early Viking churches. In addition to the Scandinavian countries, photographs shown were made in England, Holland, Switzerland, Northern Italy and France.

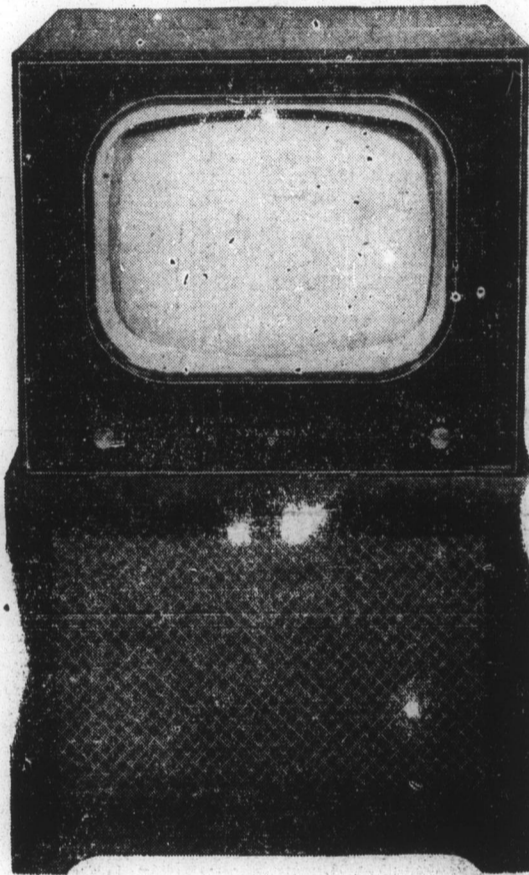
