

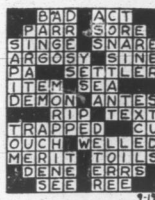
Harnett Exhibits At State Fair Expected

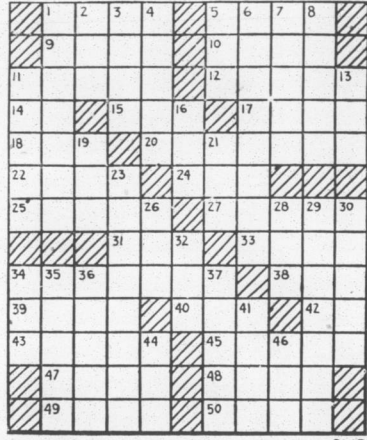

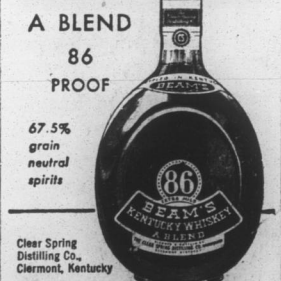
Sgt. Tart Is Home From Korea

Mr. and Mrs. Willie R. Tart of Route 2, Dunn were more than pleased to have their son, Sgt. Wilmon E. Tart, spend a thirty day furlough with them recently after a year's stay in Korea. Sgt. Tart was returned to the United States under the Army's rotation plan. He was a member of the 25th Infantry Division, one of the first U.S. units to fight on the peninsula. It has recently been engaged in patrol activity near the 38th parallel.

Sgt. Tart, who served as an attendant in the Medical company of the 35th Regimental Combat Team arrived in Korea in August 1951 and has been awarded the Combat Medical Badge. Before entering the Army he attended Meadow school near Benson.

While home on furlough Sgt. Tart was married to Miss Martha Edna Barefoot, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Barefoot of Dunn, Route 2. He has recently left for Fort Jackson for re-assignment and will be stationed at Camp Polk, La.

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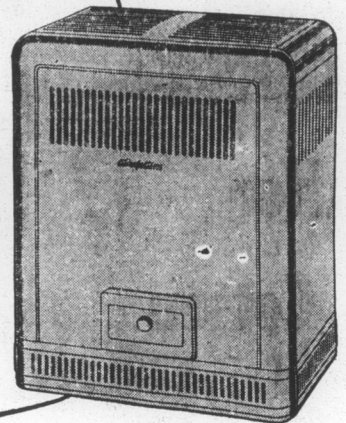
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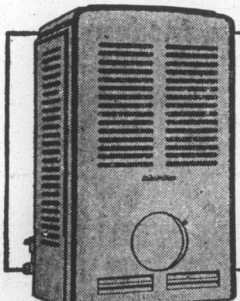
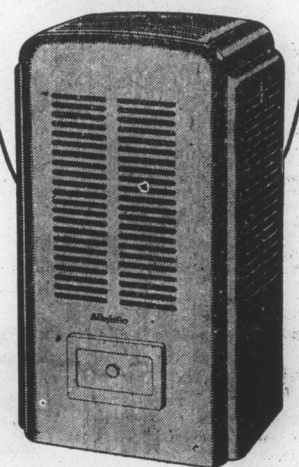
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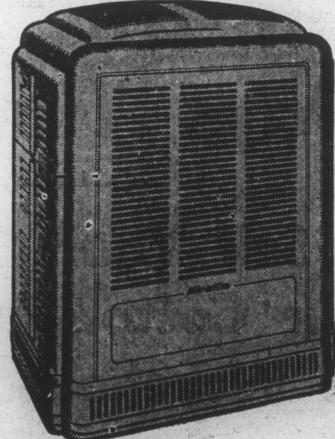
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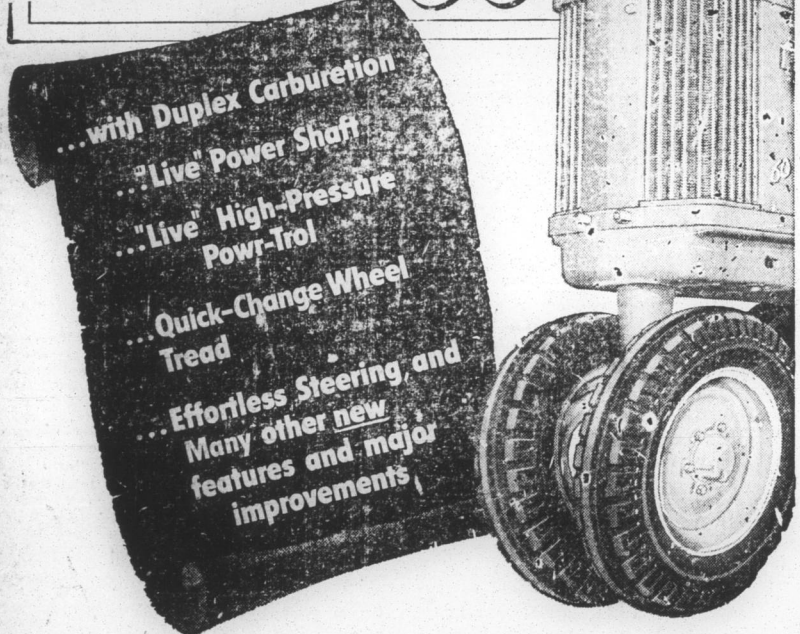
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
