all-expense scholarship; and is available to the superior and gifted graduate of the high school classes of 1953. The preliminary work by way of screening the nominees will be undertaken in the near future, and the final nominations from Harnett County will be sent up on or about November 15, 1952. These Harnett County nominations will be further screened by a District Committee of the Morehead Foundation before being certified to the state committee in Chapel Hill. The Morehead scholarship pays \$1,250.00 per year, and may be kept by the Morehead scholar for each of the four years he remains in college, provided his work and conduct is of the highest quality during the subsequent years of his college career. The scholarship may be terminated, said Mr. Bryan, if the selectees does not maintain a high quality of college performance.

The John M. Morehead Scholarship award is restricted to male students of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. It is not available to State College students.

Nominations are made from each school by a school committee consisting of three members of the school faculty of the High School, the chairman of which committee shall be the Administrative Head of the school. The final selections will be made early in 1953, and the announcement will be made prior to commencement.

Mr. Bryan explained that to be nominated by the faculty committee is quite an honor to come to any student; that to be selected by the County Committee is a recognition of the student as being a very superior individual; to be certified by the District Committee is a proof
