Kitchen 'Legger Begins His Term

Roy Cameron of Mamers, Harnett County bootlegger convicted of operating a big-time distillery in his kitchen, today began serving a six to eight months road term. The 25-year-old farmer was convicted of liquor violations in Harnett Recorder's Court on July 15. On July 22 Judge M. O. Lee imposed the road sentence. On the plea of defense attorneys judgment was deferred until October 1 to permit Cameron to harvest his crops. Commitment papers were issued by the clerk of court's office yesterday.

At the trial Sheriff's deputies testified they found three stills and 243 half gallon fruit jars filled with non-tax paid whiskey in the kitchen of the Cameron home. Cameron was convicted on two counts of illegal manufacture and possession. The road sentence was imposed on the first. On the second count judgment was suspended two years on condition he not violate the prohibition law.

bales brought the total to nine bales for the short day, by the time the sun had set. The machine was idle during the noon hour while the crew ate lunch.

"We had a little trouble at first," Mr. Byrd admitted. "It is a bit tricky to get the machine properly synchronized, and unless this is done it will not clean the rows."

MUST BE GEARED RIGHT
He explained that the speed of the machine in travelling down the rows must be geared to the speed at which the picker is extracting

the cotton from the bolls. "Unless you do this," he pointed out, "the tractor will move the machine ahead before it has time to pick up all the cotton."

However, after the first few rows, this minor difficulty was taken care of and from then on it was just a question of running the machine up and down the rows and emptying the carriage when it was filled with cotton.

WELL PLEASED
Mr. Byrd was delighted with the performance of the machine on its first day of picking, and he is anxious for his neighbors to share its use with him. He will be glad to aid any of his neighboring farm friends in their picking problems.

where they are unable to secure the necessary help. He expects to earn enough money picking for others to more than pay for his picker—and he'll be saving the other farmers money at the same time.
He has three huge wagons, each with a capacity of three bales, specially designed for hauling the cotton from the fields to the gin. A day's picking easily fills all three to capacity.
"This machine has really been a life-saver for me," he declares. "Without it I probably would never have been able to gather my crop in time. As soon as you get on to the operation it is the quickest and best method I know of get in the crop."

Tar Heel Bravery Wins Top Medal

WASHINGTON (AP) - Pvt. Bryant H. Womack who died while giving medical aid to comrades on the Korean battlefield, has been awarded the Medal of Honor. Army Secretary Frank C. Pace Jr. said the award—the 54 Medal of Honor given by the Army since the Korean war—will be given to Womack's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George W. Womack of Rutherfordton, N. C., at a later date. Womack was a member of the medical company, 14th Infantry Regiment, 25th Division, stationed near Sokso-ri, Korea, last March 2.
