Following her talk, Mr. Insko held noonday prayers.

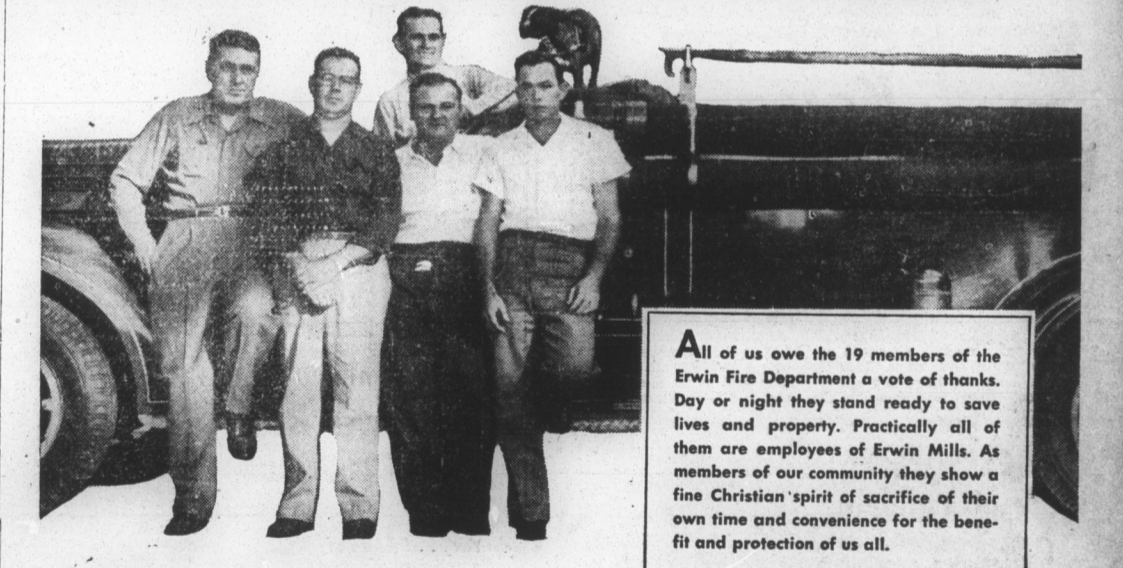
Mrs. U. T. Holmes of Chapel Hill and Diocesan president, was then introduced.
