

South's Rebellion Blamed On Truman

ATLANTA (AP) — Southern observers expressed doubt today that the Republicans can hold their new beachhead in once "Solid Dixie" after "Trumanism" is no longer an issue.

In giving Dwight D. Eisenhower three states and the heaviest popular vote in history, they said, the South was rebelling against policies of the Truman administration.

This dissension was given a terrific boost by the tremendous personal popularity of the nation's new President-elect in the South and was coupled with comparatively new issue—Tideland oil.

TRIPLED HOOVER'S VOTE

In a popular vote that almost tripled that of former President Herbert Hoover's previous best GOP showing in 1928, the Republicans swept Florida, Virginia and Texas, and were close in Tennessee and Louisiana.

But equally as basic as southern objections to the administration's "big government" and "Fair Deal" aspects was the South's century-old tradition of Democratic viewpoint.

Seven Children Die In Stove Explosion

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Firemen today believed that a coal stove explosion touched off a fire that killed seven children near here last night.

Their charred bodies, burned beyond recognition, were found in the ruins of a one-story house by firemen who "carried them out in pieces," a witness said.

The fire raged through the building so quickly that the children were dead almost before they could get in their beds. They were sleeping only a few feet from exits.

It was believed that an explosion showered flames and hot coals through the room, starting the whirlwind fire in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Howard of suburban Peoria Heights. The children ranged in age from 10 months to eight years.

The parents were not home at the time of the fire. Howard, a Negro construction worker, told deputy coroner Horace Tayton that he and his wife went to a grocery store to buy a loaf of bread and were gone about 15 or 20 minutes.
