The Big Seven shindig starts Friday at Kansas City, including all the teams in that circuit plus Yale University. The southwest Conference show starts in Dallas the same night and will include all that league's teams plus Arizona. Also starting Friday are two tournaments for smaller colleges, the Holstra tournament at Hiramstead, N. Y., and the Sioux Falls, S. D., tourney.

The Garden festival begins Saturday night with eight invited teams topped by La Salle, the nation's No. 2 ranking team.
