HYDE PARK, N. Y. (AP)—A wreath from President Eisenhower was placed on the grave of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt today—FDR's birthday anniversary.

Thus, Mr. Eisenhower continued a practice started in 1946 and carried out each year by former President Truman.

Maj. Gen. F. A. Irving, superintendent of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, performed the wreath-laying ceremony in Mr. Eisenhower's name. Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt was among those who looked on.

and six-year terms. Gov. William B. Umstead has indicated he wants to replace the present C&D board members with experts in the field of conservation, fishing and tourist development.

OTHER MATTERS UP

A number of minor matters were approved by the Senate, among them a measure which would allow persons on probation to post bond until their trial rather than being remanded immediately to prison.

Sen. John D. Larkins of Trenton, chairman of the Appropriations Committee, reported that requests by state agencies for supplementary budget appropriations now total \$20,500,000.

"And we've still got three weeks to go on the hearings," Larkins said. The joint appropriations committee is hearing requests from state agencies and departments for funds above the amounts recommended by the Advisory Budget Commission.

MEDICAL BILL

Rep. John W. Umstead of Chapel Hill introduced a measure today calling for an annual appropriation of \$50,000 to the North Carolina Medical Care commission to encourage medical students and student nurses to study psychiatry.

Umstead, chairman of the Mental Hospitals Committee, proposed a loan of not more than \$2,000 per scholastic year for North Carolina residents studying psychiatry at Duke University, Bowman Gray School of Medicine at Winston-Salem or the medical school of the University of North Carolina.

One year's loan would be cancelled upon completion by the student of each year of "satisfactory service as a staff member" at either of the state hospitals at Goldsboro, Morganton or Raleigh.
