NEW YORK (AP) — Actress Zsa Zsa Gabor has denied any plan to divorce her actor husband, George Sanders, with this comment: "Right now, we love each other very much, but in 10 years, who knows? You men are impossible, you know that!"

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republican leader Robert A. Taft has admitted that he and Sen. Harry F. Byrd D-Va. have been trying to "guide President Eisenhower. Taft said Byrd's guiding leads the President to church while his own would take Eisenhower to the "golf links."

PERTH AMBOY, N. J. (AP) — Police said a discriminating thief broke into an inn here, ignored money and jewelry in the cash register, and stole six bottles of the Basin Inn's finest whisky.

COLFAX, Wash. (AP) — Harry Boch complained to state game protector Lloyd Logie that people were fishing out of season in a creek running through Boch's land. Logie decided to check up and found Boch and his son-in-law fishing. They were fined \$35 each.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Sam Harris received his income tax refund Monday—seven checks totaling \$581. Harris received his own refund check and six others. He's returning the other checks—amounting to \$575.

SOMEWHERE IN KOREA (AP) — The U. S. 45th Infantry Division boasted today the only bowling alley in Korea. Two 13-foot, plywood lanes were built at the division's replacement company through the efforts of Sgt. Earl Benkart, Jr., of Pittsburgh, Pa., and M-Sgt. Frank Sprout of Temple, Tex. The pins, eight inches high, were made in an Inchon lumbershop, and the bowling balls are regular billiard balls airmailed from the United States by Sprout's wife.

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Argentine President Juan D. Peron says his country will always stand at the side of Israel because its cause is "just and honest." Peron made the statement yesterday to a delegation of the Jewish community of Chile which thanked him for his friendship toward Israel and his previous condemnation of communist anti-Semitism. The Argentine chief executive is making a state visit to Chile.

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — An Allied tank-supported raiding party in a four-hour battle today smashed out of a Communist trap in no-man's land taking a heavy toll of Reds. Heavy clouds blanketed most of North Korea hampering air attacks throughout last night and today.

HALIFAX, N. S. (AP) — Seven persons died today in a fire in a Halifax tenement house. Police said the victims included five children, a man and a woman. The fire broke out at 4:10 a. m. EST. It was several hours before the flames were brought under control.

CHICAGO (AP) — The wife of Robert Bob Fitzsimmons, former middleweight, light-heavyweight and heavyweight boxing champion of the world, is in critical condition today in American Hospital. Authorities said the 69-year-old widow of "Ruby Robert" was suffering from a stomach ailment.

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP) — The Chinese Nationalist parliament adopted a resolution today abrogating the 1945 treaty of friendship and alliance between Russia and Nationalist China.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House announced today that President Eisenhower will fly to Augusta, Ga., Thursday afternoon for a weekend of golf. Because he will be leaving the city Thursday, the President will hold his second weekly news conference here tomorrow at 12:15 p. m.

HAVANA, Cuba (AP) — Four persons were killed and one wounded in a 90-minute gun battle last night between police and fugitives hiding out in Havana's fashionable suburb of Vedado. The fugitives opened fire with machine guns and pistols when police raided the house. Three of the fugitives were killed along with a sailor who was helping the police. A policeman was wounded.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay today asked Congress to give coastal states title to submerged lands out to the historical boundaries. But McKay, giving details for the first time of the Eisenhower administration's viewpoint in the long controversy over the offshore lands, said the federal government should keep exclusive control over the areas seaward from the historical boundaries to the continental shelf.

CHICAGO (AP) — Former Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson said Russia is trying to woo Arab nations with its recent anti-Semitic outbreaks. Stevenson, defeated Democratic presidential candidate, told 1,200 members of Decalogue, society of Jewish lawyers, last night that the anti-Semitic wave is "Hitler's ghost emerging from the walls of the Kremlin to accomplish in death what he could not do in life."

HANOVER, Germany (AP) — Former Field Marshal Gerd Von Rundstedt, the man who directed Hitler's last-gasp "Battle of the Bulge" in an attempt to break the back of the Allied invasion of Europe, died last night. His death was announced today by members of his family.

## Lindley Resigns As A C President

WILSON (AP) — Dr. D. Ray Lindley, president of Atlantic Christian College since July, 1950, resigned today after submitting a report to the college board of trustees that ACC will be "completely debt-free" on April 1.

Lindley will return to Texas Christian University, his alma mater, to become administrative vice president.

Trustees expressed surprise and "deepest regret" at the resignation.

"Because of the fine work he has done at Atlantic Christian, our institution is in excellent condition," trustees Chairman T. J. Hackney of Wilson said. "We lose him knowing that he will carry with him into his new position the same type of driving spirit that has meant so much to Atlantic Christian College."

Lindley's resignation was accepted effective June 1. Lofton A. Tart of Dunn is a member of the board.

Before coming here Lindley was dean of TCU's Bible College of the Bible.

Lindley's report to the trustees said that the \$200,000 college debt set up to run for 10 years when he came here will be completely paid off with a final \$45,000 payment April 1.

In addition to liquidating the debt seven and a half years ahead of schedule, the college has gained more than \$300,000 in permanent assets under Lindley's administration. Enrollment for 1952-53 is 24 per cent above that for 1951-52 and the number of faculty members holding earned doctor's degrees is approximately three times the number on the faculty a few years ago.
