An impressive double ring ceremony in the Lillington Presbyterian Church on Sunday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock united in marriage Miss Lynn Lewis and Bob F. Helms.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. F. Lewis of Lillington, the bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Fred Helms of New Bern, formerly of Concord.

Preceding the ceremony a program of wedding music was presented by Miss Nancy Hammond of Cero Gordo, organist, and Miss Barbara Hill of Graham, soloist. Miss Hammond sang "Through the Years" and the Bach chorale "Thou Art My Love", using the "Wedding Prayer" for the benediction.

Marriage vows were exchanged in a setting of white gladioli and palms with Dr. David A. Huffines, Jr., pastor of the bride officiating.

Given in marriage by her father the bride wore a gown of chantilly lace and tulle over bridal satin. The lace bodice fashioned with a portrait neckline embroidered with seed pearls and sequins ended in a point above the bouffant tulle skirt.
