

A letter received from Ralph D. Clement, Raleigh dentist, gave a full explanation of the program for the City Manager.

In a recent Goldsboro speech, Clement debunked the fluoride pro-gram as "a Communist-inspired mass medigation." Clement cop-tinued to debunk the program in his letter to Uzzle.

Blame for the program should be placed on the U.S. Public Health Service, Dr. Clement stated. He pointed out that the USPHS has been wrong in the past about their recommendations, and "are wrong
