Authorities said a "substantial" part of the loot had been recovered and that other persons had been implicated in the case. But no new arrests were expected immediately, they said.

DENIED KNOWLEDGE
O'Brien, his wife, and son denied knowledge of the robbery, the slickest since \$1,218,000 was taken in the Boston Brinks holdup two years earlier. The Brinks case never has been solved.

The elder O'Brien was known in the exclusive neighborhood of suburban Woodstock where he lived in a \$25,000 home as a real gentleman and his wife as a matronly, pleasant woman. But O'Brien had a record of two prison terms served for burglary and larceny.

Agents said he posed as a construction executive but actually held no job.

Two months ago, at the time of the robbery, the O'Brien's lived in a third floor walkup tenement in Boston's crowded Dorchester section.

Last January they moved into their new home, where the family became acquainted with the neighbors, and the wife borrowed kitchen supplies and chatted with nearby acquaintances.

The son who was arrested Wednesday lived on the MIT campus, made excellent grades as a third year engineering student, and was known as the son of a well-to-do executive. He was suspended by college authorities immediately after his arrest.

They again were on the trail of the family almost from the time they moved into the suburban Boston neighborhood. Their next door neighbors were alerted to keep them under surveillance and make regular reports.

The neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur L. McGilvray, said Mr. and Mrs. O'Brien were known generally as a "nice couple."

"Mr. O'Brien was a dapper person and well spoken," said Mrs. McGilvray. "He was one of the first men in the neighborhood to wear a homburg hat."
