(Continued from page one) first term as executive secretary, made an encouraging report and thanked the council for the cooperation shown. She also officiated at the induction ceremony for new officers.

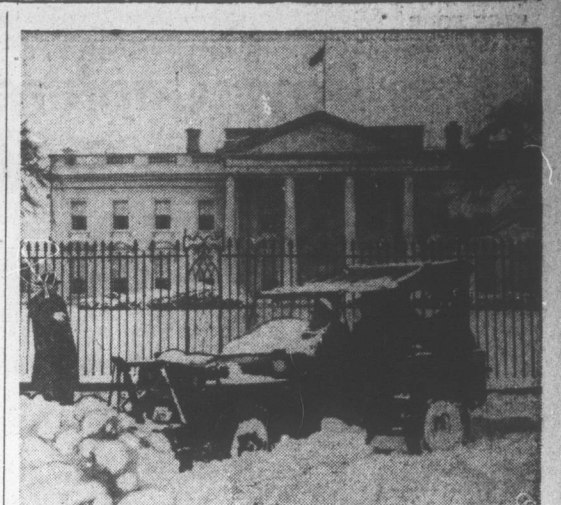
Reports were made by retiring chairman W. W. Seymour of Sanford, financial chairman and Mrs. Hal Bradley of Lillington, troop organization chairman.
