Continued From Page One! Havana, Cuba, this afternoon, less than a day after a high-altitude airplane trip apparently cured her of a death-dealing virus infection. Little Maria Elena Alonso had arrived here late last night aboard a big National Airlines DC3 airliner after her doctor prescribed a flight at an altitude of 3,000 feet or more as a sure bet to kill the virus.

WASHINGTON (AP) — This is official from the Naval Observatory: Spring will start in the northern hemisphere at 10:54 p. m. EST, Saturday, March 20. That will be the time "the sun crosses the equator in its northern journey."

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court's sanction of state ownership of the "tidelands" cleared offshore oil production and payment of millions in piled-up royalties to three states. The court's action is expected to dispel the remaining clouds hanging over the claim of coastal states to the ocean bottom lands adjacent to their shores. Federal vs state ownership of the lands had been a political, legal and legislative issue for 17 years.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate majority leader William F. Knowland indicated today he will sidestep an immediate showdown on the administration's farm program.

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — Representatives of five Asian nations will hold an "anti-Communist" conference in South Korea in late April at the same time the five-power conference is being held in Geneva.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House-Senate Atomic Energy Committee today began digging into the mystery of missing "highly secret" papers at the Hanford, Wash., atomic plant.

KINSTON (AP) — Attorney John Dawson of Kinston today had the endorsement of the Lenoir County Bar Assn. for the State Senate seat held by John D. Larkins of Trenton, but was not sure that he would run.

RALEIGH (AP) — Agriculture Commissioner L. J. Ballentine protested today that an executive of the North Carolina Farm Bureau Federation did not speak for the majority of North Carolina farmers when he testified last week before the Senate Agriculture Committee. Ballentine sent telegrams to North Carolina congressmen and senators yesterday objecting to the testimony given by E. Flake Shaw, executive vice president of the bureau. Ballentine said he does not believe the majority of Tar Heel farmers favor flexible price supports.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI today placed a burly escape artist with a record of five prison breaks on its list of the 10 most wanted fugitives. He is James William Lofton, a 34-year-old native of Owassa, Ala. He has been missing since August, 1952, when he led a mass break-out from the Alcorn state prison farm in Alabama.

PARIS (AP) — Maria Lani, once France's most famous artist's model, died in a hospital today after a lingering illness. Such painters as Henri Matisse, Georges Braque,

NEW YORK (AP) — AFL longshoremen went to work on more than half a dozen strike-bound piers today to break the 12-day wildcat walkout of the rival independent dock union.

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Thirty-one Negro leaders from 15 Southern states labeled the investigation of the Southern Conference Educational Fund "an attack upon the Negro community of this nation." The Senate Internal Security sub-committee is scheduled to begin hearings Thursday on alleged Communist activities of the fund.

HANOI, Indochina (AP) — "Unbelievable" Communist artillery cut off Dien Bien Phu's two airports today and its besieged 10,000-man French garrison was fighting against odds of four to one. French commanders admitted the war was yet to come in the biggest perhaps most decisive battle of the seven-year Indochina war.

NEW YORK (AP) — Director Theodore C. Streibert of the U. S. Information Agency businesses operating overseas pool their public relations programs to combat communism.

PARIS (AP) — The three Western Allied high commissioners today reminded West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer that their approval is required before any changes can be made in the West German Constitution.

CHAPEL HILL (AP) — A committee investigating "liberalism" among Baptist students today was under fire from the new president of the Baptist Student Union at the University of North Carolina. Tom Mauldin, elected Sunday night, said here yesterday that the committee was not dealing in good faith with the students.

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP) — The Philadelphia Phillies today announced the sale of first baseman Eddie Waitkus to the Baltimore Orioles in a straight cash deal.

Waivers were obtained from other National League clubs in order to complete the deal, the Phillies said, but the amount of cash involved was not disclosed.

MIDLAND, Tex. (AP) — A Continental Airlines Convair on a flight from El Paso, Tex., to Kansas City made a crash landing in a sand dune six miles east of here today, injures three of the 11 persons aboard, none seriously.

ROME (AP) — An offer by Foreign Minister Attilio Piccioni to resign because his name has been linked with Italy's drug-sex "scandal trial of the century" was rejected by the Cabinet today.

HOLYWELL, Eng. (AP) — A British tavern was given permission today to extend its drinking time an extra hour tomorrow night on the off chance the White Lady of Holywell might show up. It was believed the first time in British drinking history that a pub's hours were changed to accommodate a guest — for that's what the White Lady is.

TOKYO (AP) — Police arrested pretty Takako Takano, 24 a barmaid, Monday and charged she swindled four men out of 100,000 yen, about \$300. They said she promised marriage to all four, then turned the money they provided for a souse-what more steady — boyfriend.
