Easter Bunny Brings Dessert



Delight each small child at the party with a bunny nest. Take a cue for quick desserts from the Easter rabbit. He finds the principal ingredients that he needs in the bread box and the freezer. A few quick hops to the pantry shelf produce coconut and almonds to glorify his Easter Almond-Coconut Nests—a simple dessert to delight all those who believe in the springtime visitor. The nests cost but pennies and are suitable for great big large or small. The nests are made similarly to the way you make caramel popcorn. A hot syrup is poured over cubes of toasted enriched bread, coconut and chopped almonds; the mixture formed into nests. Fill them with ice cream and top with coconut and almonds. Easter Almond-Coconut Nests 3/4 cup corn syrup 3/4 cup brown sugar 1 tablespoon molasses 1 cup water 1 quart toasted 3/4" bread cubes 1/2 cup chopped roasted almonds 1/2 cup shredded coconut 1 pint vanilla ice cream Topping 3/4 tablespoon shredded coconut 1/2 tablespoon chopped roasted almonds Combine corn syrup, brown sugar, molasses and water in a deep saucepan. Boil slowly for 10 minutes, or until a little of the syrup forms a soft ball in cold water. Add bread cubes, almonds and coconut. Cook, stirring, for 5 minutes. Pour mixture into a buttered, oiled cup, leaving the center hollow. Chill to serve, fill each nest with 1/4 cup ice cream, sprinkle coconut and almonds over top. YIELD: 6 servings

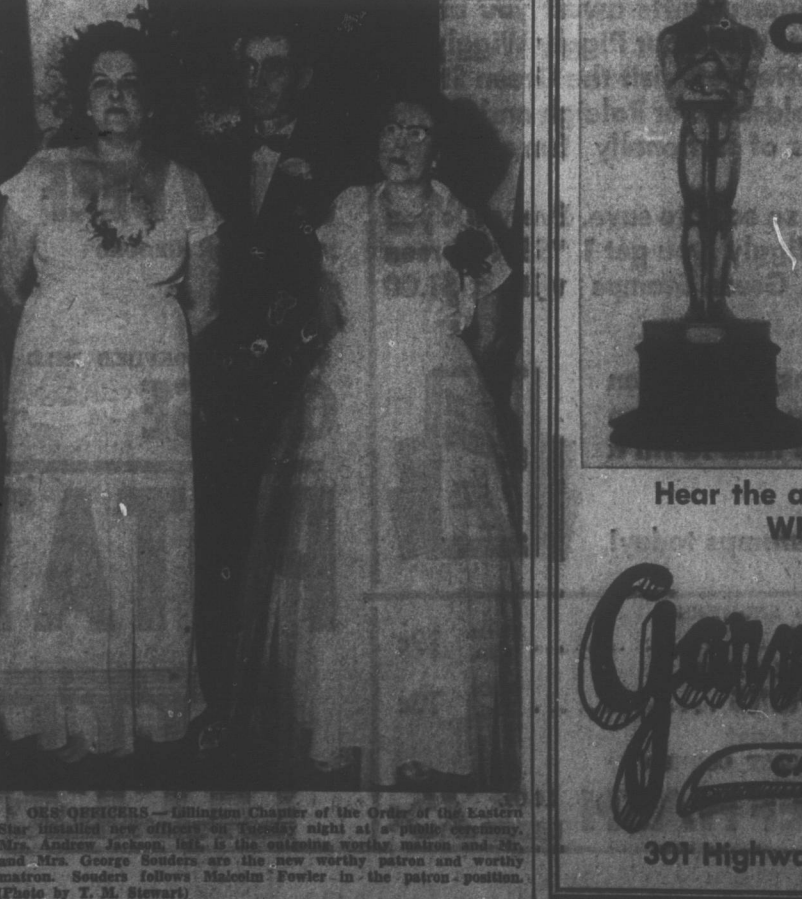

Sorrell Drops

(Continued from page one) told the court that he "went to 'Shugs'" around 1 o'clock on the night of March 5, or morning of March 6. While there, he stated, he met a friend who was drinking and he had one beer. POLICE FOLLOWED CAR Officers H. F. Pope and K. M. Fall testified that Sorrell was arrested near The Daily Record office around 2 o'clock a. m. March 6. Pope said that he had followed the car driven by Sorrell for some time and that he crossed the white line several times. Several witnesses appeared for Sorrell, but none of them testified that they knew too much about his condition at the time he was arrested. The witnesses had been at "Shugs," an eating place between Duan and Erwin with Sorrell on the night he was arrested. The popular night spot was padlocked yesterday in a sweeping order by District Solicitor Jack Hooks to close places selling illegal liquor. Others tried in court today included: John Cameron, driving drunk, 90 days, suspended for 12 months on payment of \$100 and court cost. His license was revoked for 12 months. A case charging Lee Adley with drunkenness was heard but prayer for judgment was continued. A case against William Edward Phillips charging driving drunk was also continued. William Patrick Tart, Dunn while youth, was given 60 days in jail, suspended for 12 months on payment of \$25 and court cost and on condition that he not drive a car for 90 days.
