Hagarty Getting Photo Practice WASHINGTON (UP) - Backstairs at the White House: Presidential Press Secretary James O. Hagarty has been getting some impromptu experience as a photographer. But he hasn't the slightest idea how his pictures turn out.

The occasional experience comes when large groups visit President Eisenhower - usually in connection with some civic, educational, charitable or patriotic movement. Weather permitting, Mr. Eisenhower frequently greets them, and poses for pictures with them in the rose garden adjoining his office or on a grassy knoll in the lawn nearby.

Often members of such groups, particularly those from out of town who seldom get a chance to meet a president, bring cameras in hopes of snapping their own personal picture of the Chief Executive. Their cameras range from the simplest box type to expensive models with range finders, shutter adjustments, and flash attachments.

In order to snap a picture of Mr. Eisenhower from the best vantage point, however, they have to circle behind a wall of the news photographers and newsreel cameramen who regularly cover the White House. The regulars manage to work all right under such conditions but the amateurs, taking longer to focus and get set, frequently run into trouble. They find the heads and shoulders of the regular photographers in their way.

That's where Hagarty comes in. The obliging press secretary, even though he is busy herding the flock of reporters and photographers covering the event, finds time occasionally to take the visitor's camera and snap the desired picture.

The visitor leaves with his picture of Mr. Eisenhower on a roll of film along with such other Washington scenes as the usual tourist attractions - the Capitol, the White House grounds, Lincoln Memorial and Washington Monument. The roll probably isn't developed until the visitor gets back home. Hagarty never knows he has produced a reasonable likeness of Mr. Eisenhower or his cropped-off head, feet, or either shoulder.

Just about everybody who visits the White House wants a photographic memento of the occasion. The most coveted prize, of course, is a picture of the visitor with President Eisenhower. They are sought by members of Congress who bring in constituents or attempt bill-signing ceremonies, businessmen, visiting dignitaries and just about every one of the President's daily appointments schedule.

Since there is some news connected with these visits, the news photographers who regularly cover the White House usually are summoned to the President's office to shoot pictures of Mr. Eisenhower and his visitors. For years they have been summoned from the
