Farrington, 56, died of a heart attac. in his office Saturday night. He had served as a Republican delegate from Hawaii since 1942 and friends said he worked virtually to the last minute of his life for Hawaiian statehood.

Funeral services were scheduled this afternoon for Hunt who shot himself while at his desk in the Senate Office Building Saturday morning and died four hours later in Casuality Hospital.

Fellow senators said the 61-year-old Democratic lawmaker was suffering from cancer of the kidney. Friends said Farrington, a lifelong newspaperman who rose from reporter to publisher of the Honolulu Star-Bulletin, spent Saturday afternoon at the Capitol working, as he had through the years, in behalf of statehood for Hawaii.

Hunt's body will be flown to Cheyenne, Wyo., for burial tomorrow morning. Although the senstor was born is Isabell, Ill., and lived at Lander, Wyo., Cheyenne was chosen as the final resting place because he had spent so many years there as governor, secretary of state and state legislator.

Hunt, whose term ends next January, announced less than two weeks ago he would not seek relection because of ill health.

His death leveled off the Senate's narrow margin of power to 47 Democrats, 47 Republicans and one Independent, Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon.
