## **Schools To Take** Large Tax Share

During the 1954-55 fiscal year Harnett County will collect \$1.25 per \$100 valuation in taxes to operate the county.

Schools will take the largest share, or 75 cents, with the remain ing 50 cents apportioned as follows

General county fund 20 cents; poor fund, 10 cents; health fund seven cents; county accountan one cent; county agent, three cents; veterans service office, one cent; old age assistance fund, five cents; and aid to dependent children fund

In addition a special levy of 15 cents will be collected in Averasboro for chools. In addition to the \$1.25 rate, township road refunding hond tax rates will be collected as follows: Anderson Creek, one cent; Black River, two cents; Groek, ten cents; Johnsonville 23 cents; Lillington five cents; Neill's Creek, one cent; Stewart's Creek 12 cents; and Upper Little River three cents.
