

## Sees No Reason Why Weapons Can't Be Used

WASHINGTON (IP)-President Eisenhower told his news conference today that stock market conditions on the whole seem to be very satisfactory. He counseled great caution in undertaking any step which might damage public confidence in the economy.

The chief executive said that as far as he knows, nothing in the current Senate investigation of the stock market boom has done anything to undermine confidence.

He added, however, that as a general proposition in the promotion of an expanding economy, great care should be taken to avoid doing anything that would undersmine public confidence.

WOULD USE WEAPONS

President Eisenhower said he no reason why tactical atomic weapons should not be used against

weapons should not be used against strictly military targets should this country become involved again in any major fighting.

The President generally echoed the prediction, by Secretary of State John Fester Dulles yesterday that small tactical atomic weapons would be used by this country if the United States became involved in a major military

The President added under news conference questioning that it would be foolish to ignore the fact that the dangers of war are greater than they were some years ago. The President said he believes the Republicans could win in 1956 with any presidential candidate worthy of the position — provinen the GOP puts across a program that will benefit all Americans.

He declined to discuss his own indispensability or lack of it. He simply told his news conference that the strength of the GOP in the next election will ile primarily in the Republican program for the country.
