Mr. Tart about the incident when he came home and Tart went across the street to John Lockamy's store and filling station in search of Goodwin.  
When he found Goodwin, Moore said, he plunged a pocket knife into his chest twice just below the heart.  
Moore said Goodwin retaliated by slashing Tart's throat.  
The officer said he swore out the warrants after talking with both men and after they refused to take action themselves.  
"I don't think a crime that serious should go unpunished," said the officer.  
Moore also charged Goodwin with assaulting Mrs. Tart. Both men were freed under bond of \$300 each.

**By UNITED PRESS**  
Former President Hoover, answering Democratic charges that he stacked his commission's task force on water power resources with men who had "vested interests" and excluded public power spokesmen:  
"We were conducting an objective inquiry and not a donnybrook fair."  
Attorney Howard P. Welch, defending Airman Daniel Schmidt's qualifications for bringing up his son, object of a custody battle with his wife, Una, who remarried while he was in a Korean prison camp:  
"He's already proved he's a man. He proved in prison he was true to his country, true to his buddies and true to himself. How can you question the ability of a man like that?"

**JERUSALEM, Israel (P)** — Former Premier David Ben-Gurion, "strong man" of the dominant Labor Party, has accepted the task of forming a new Israeli Cabinet.

**FRASER, Colo. (P)** — President Eisenhower has accepted the resignation of Archie A. Alexander as governor of the Virgin Islands.

**BUENOS AIRES (P)** — Argentine security forces prepared today to crack down on any anti-Peron activities by Catholics.

**FORT WAYNE, Ind. (P)** — The National Educational Association has been charged with being a "company union" by the AFL American Federation of Teachers.

**CHICAGO (P)** — Jules DuBois, Latin American correspondent for the Chicago Tribune, said today that Argentine federal police followed his every movement for 55 days in Buenos Aires and sent him appointed warning to be "careful in crossing the street."

**WASHINGTON (P)** — Americans for Democratic Action charged today that the dismissal of a Negro housing official "makes a mockery" of civil rights pledges made by President Eisenhower. ADA criticized the administration for ousting Frank S. Horne, a Democrat, as assistant to Federal Housing Chief Albert M. Cole on racial housing.

**NEW YORK (P)** — Joseph P. Ryan, retired president of the International Longshoremen's Association, was indicted by a federal grand jury today on charges of evading more than \$32,000 in income taxes over a four-year period.

## Mom Crosses Nation To Bedside Of Son

**HOUSTON, Tex. (P)** — A congressman and others joined forces to whisk a distraught mother across the country to the bedside of her injured son here last night.

The trip began at shipside in New York yesterday when Mrs. Billie Wilkinson, 32, Mobile, Ala., arrived on the Queen Elizabeth from London and was told that her son, George, 6, was seriously injured in an auto accident.

Rep. Frank Boykin (D-Ala.) had heard of the accident here Sunday and that George was in a serious condition after brain surgery yesterday. He called Gov. Averell Harriman of New York while the boy's father George C. Wilkinson, called

his wife by ship-shore telephone. She was arriving from a Baptist World Alliance meeting in London.

Gov. Harriman sent a police escort and called Eddie Rickenbacker, president of Eastern Air Lines. A helicopter met Mrs. Wilkinson at shipside and whisked her to Idlewild Airport and a plane for Houston.

Mrs. Wilkinson arrived here last night and with her husband went straight to Heights Hospital and little George, whose nickname is "Neal." Neal's governess, Mrs. Wayne Clendennin, 45; Webb Spencer, 37, chauffeur, and Neal's four-year-old brother Shepard were also injured in the auto smashup.

## Admiral Burke Takes Command Of Fleet

**ANNAPOLIS, Md. (P)** — Adm. Arleigh A. Burke took command of America's mighty fleets today and warned that U. S. sea supremacy faces a "greater challenge" than ever before in this atomic age.

As the new chief of naval operations, the 53-year-old admiral promised to push for "even higher preparations" to keep the Navy the world's best.

The oath-taking ceremony, at which Burke formally took over from Adm. Robert B. Carney, 60, was held in the Naval Academy's mammoth drill hall before more than 2,000 spectators, including two squadrons of midshipmen and Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin of Maryland.

It was the most colorful in modern naval annals. Booming guns from a nearby battery, 1,163 smartly-dressed midshipmen and a 37-piece academy band saluted the

new Navy chief. It was the first time a chief of naval operations had been inducted outside of a Washington office since the post was created in 1915.

This was Burke's personal wish. The admiral, promoted over 90 other officers who had greater service seniority, sought to emphasize the close connection between his Pentagon post and the Navy's seagoing fighting men. His original plan to hold the ceremony aboard an aircraft carrier at Norfolk Va., had to be canceled because of the threat of hurricane Diane.

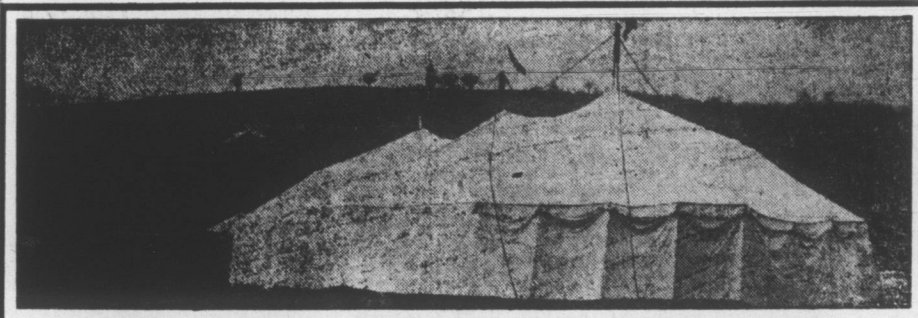
