The dinner given Wednesday night at the school cafeteria in Angier for Governor and Mrs. Luther Hodges was marked by old fashioned decorations and appointments in keeping with the simplicity of clothes and furnishings in Harnett County a century ago.

An old fashioned surrey stood beside the doorway, opened by butler. Inside was a "phant" spinning wheel and on a small platform a manikill wearing a black and white muslin dress worn by the great grandmother of Mrs. Harry Dupree.

The small black pocketbook, black hat and gloves also were articles worn in the county a century ago.

Home economics girls who served wore black dresses with white aprons and bonnets. A baked ham plate, with ice cream and cake, was served.

Governor and Mrs. Hodges and other officials were seated at a long table decorated with national and State flags. The floral arrangement for this table was an old bread tray filled with marigolds, cox comb, and other fall flowers arranged by Miss Wilma Williams.

Other guests were seated at tables for four throughout the room, each table decked in the center with a tall orange taper and bordered with a pair of the same dolls in green paper skirts. Old fashioned lanterns burned in each window.

D. W. Denning, Jr., was master of ceremonies and Scottish ballads were sung by Miss Jo Allen, vocalist. Joe Currin, tobaccoist and chairman of the Angier district school committee, introduced the Governor.
