"He just couldn't seem to do enough for us that night," recalled Taylor today. The little ball players kept him busy signing autographs and he filled 'all sorts of unusual requests for them."
Taylor said that Griffith retained his interest in Dunn's Kneepants League and told him that such groups as his made an everlasting contribution to baseball. The Dunn man and the great baseball notable kept in touch with each other as long as Griffith's health permitted.
