Morals Man Accused In Immorality

MONTREAL (AP) — The chief of Montreal's morality squad was suspended today after two morals charges were filed against him, Assistant Police Director Pacifico Plante announced.

The action was taken against Inspector Armand Courval, who appeared in court on charges brought by Jacques Sauriol, newspaperman and unsuccessful mayoralty candidate.

Sauriol, also a member of the Quebec provincial censor board, accused Courval of performing an abortion and criminally assaulting a feeble-minded teen-ager. Courval was freed in \$950 bail on the abortion count, with a preliminary hearing set for Nov. 3. He was paroled on the second count.

Sauriol faces a libel suit brought by Courval following publication of an article attacking the morality squad chief.

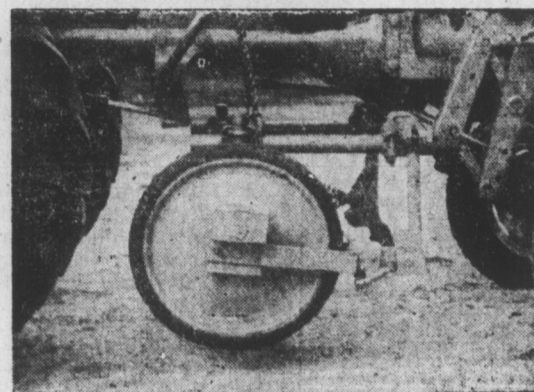

George Merritt, a Negro owner of the cabin, apparently thought



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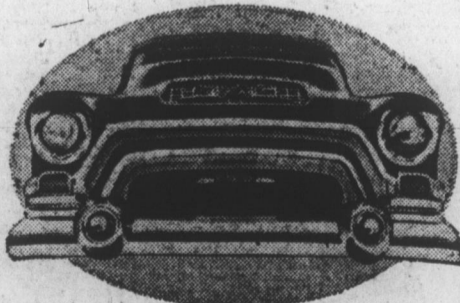
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
