Ike Taking Full Charge Of Government

DENVER — President Eisenhower is taking "full charge" of the government now, Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell, reported, although the Chief Executive's return to a daily working schedule at the White House may be some months away.

Mitchell saw the President late Wednesday and was asked, "did you discuss with the President when he might be taking full charge of the government again—when he might be back on the job?"

Mitchell replied, "I would assume he is taking full charge now." Not since the President suffered a heart attack Sept. 24 has there been any serious question of his not being in legal command of the government, although much of his normal work and areas of decision had to be taken over by key members of his administration.

Seek To Lighten Load
Several cabinet members who have visited recently at Fitzsimons Army Hospital which Mr. Eisenhower expects to leave Nov. 11 have commented on their efforts to speed his recovery and lighten his load by assuming more responsibility themselves.

Mitchell's brief reference to "taking full charge now" represented no sudden change in the President's hospital routine, but it did reflect the fact that each day finds him stronger and able to devote more time to official duties. The main purpose of Mitchell's visit was to review administration legislative recommendations to be submitted to Congress next year. Mitchell said the administration would continue to back the long-delayed amendments to the Taft-Hartley law, but he saw no chance of the Democratic controlled Congress in 1956 passing them.
