His action came within a day after charges of misconduct in public office were dismissed in Harnett Superior Court egainst the incumbent, Judge M. O. Lee. Lee had been charged by a grand jury indictment with trying to hold cases while intoxicated. Judge Lee is expected to seek reelection. Spence, who has been practicing

law for two years, is a native of Harnett County, the son of Mrs. Broughton Spence and the late Mr. Spence. He holds a L. L. D. degree from the University of North Carolina Law school, and also attended N. C. State College, Campbell College; and the University of North Carolina as an undergraduate.
