NEW YORK—(NEA) — How does fashion shape up for 1956? According to this nation's top designers, clothes will be both pretty and wearable. No woman could ask for more.

Here are the style keynotes for the next year, as picked by America's big name designers: Slim and full silhouettes: Karen Stark of Harvey Berni forecasts a little slim and a little full in most costumes. Tunics, over-skirts and panels will break the slender line.

Tina Leser sees the mandarin coat, the kimono and Oriental embroideries as continuing favorites. **SHORTER COATS:** Ben Zuckerman thinks the coat that's definitely (or only slightly) shorter than the dress beneath will win fashion favor.

THE UNCORSETED LOOK: There will be a return of the natural figure, according to Evelyn Dawson of Suzy Perette. This "natural figure" will be achieved by dressmaking science and new materials which mould while looking pliable.

The return of the black dress: Nettie Rosenstein expects lots of basic blacks with bright or pastel accessories.

Prints for formal clothes: Designer Maurice Rentner predicts lots of printed fabrics (satin, chiffon, silk organza) for cocktail and evening clothes.

Dreamy Evening Clothes: Cell Chapman sees a great future for the floating chiffon evening dress in place of the crisp, bouffant dress.

SHOE IMPORTANCE: Roger Vivier or Delman forecasts these shoes essential to every wardrobe: the bright colored shoe to match a dress or suit, the patterned silk shoe to match a hat or handbag and the shoe with its own "jewelry" in glittering buckles or heels.

Frouton Without Frills: Roxane of Samuel Winston forecasts richness that is never obvious. An example is lace and embroidery in the same color as the dress.
