**TOKYO** (P) — A U. S. Marine Corps FJ2 Fury jet fighter crashed and burned in a residential area of Tokyo today, killing the pilot and injuring at least three Japanese civilians.

**DYERSBURG, Tenn.** (P) — The Forked Deer River continued to rise here today and about 100 families had been forced from their homes by high water. The river was expected to keep rising through tonight.

## Teener And Aunt Take Love Jaunt

**NEW YORK**—A strapping, 15-year-old boy, who ran away with his aunt, the mother of three, and lived as her husband during a three-week Florida idyll, yesterday was sent to the Hudson County Juvenile Home in Bayonne, N. J., by Juvenile Judge Morris Barrison in Jersey City.

The woman, red-haired June Moriarity, 29, of 8007 Adams St., West New York, is at liberty in \$1,000 bail pending action by the Hudson County grand jury on a charge of impairing the morals of a minor.

Mrs. Moriarity and the boy left West New York Jan. 12 in her car and lived in a Miami trailer camp. When their \$16 in cash ran out, Mrs. Moriarity worked in a restaurant. Then she telephoned her startlingly understanding husband, Daniel, who forgave her at once and wired plane fare home, police said.

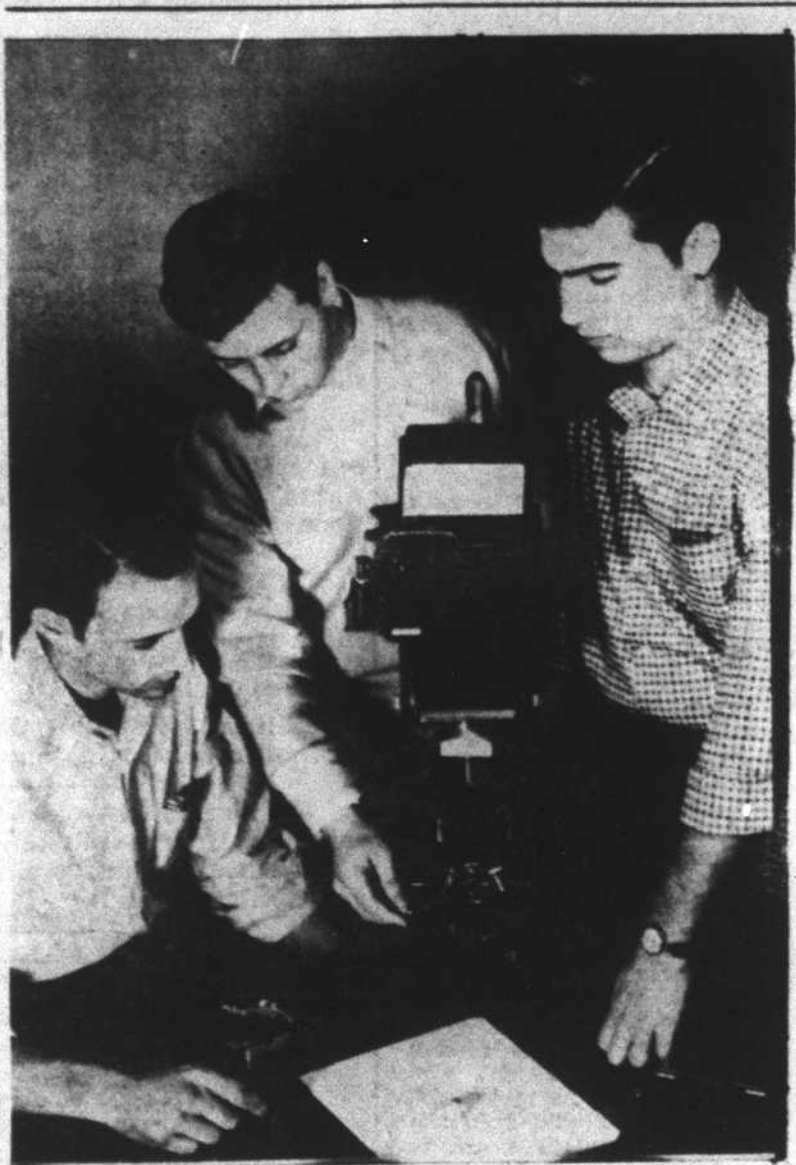
At the same time, the boy telephoned his mother, a sister of Daniel Moriarity, and his plane fare was forwarded. Both were arrested on police complaints.

The youth, 6 feet tall, stood with downcast eyes as his aunt was arraigned before Magistrate Ray Otis in West New York Municipal Court and muttered: "I still love her."

**SAN FRANCISCO** (P) — Lorraine Staker, 43, a spinster school teacher, pleading innocent to receiving stolen goods, today publicly proclaimed her love for a wealthy, married doctor who rescued her from a life of prostitution nearly 20 years ago and has offered her aid in her present trouble.

She was arrested yesterday with three other women and a man in what police described as an elaborate fencing operation for a ring of shoplifters.

Today, however, the criminal charges faded into the background as the 18-year-old romance between the prominent married surgeon and the schoolmarm came to light.

"I am very much in love with him. He is the most wonderful man in the world—but I think we Staker sobbed.

Dr. Rodney A. Yoell, 62, came immediately to the teacher's aid when she was arrested and freely admitted a clandestine love affair that he lasted for 18 years. Father of three grown children, he and his wife, Helen, have been separated for years, but were never divorced because of religious beliefs.

"I never hid her from my friends," Dr. Yoell said. "I don't know if it's right or wrong. But I would be a heel if I didn't suck by her."

The doctor said he induced Miss Staker to give up the life of a call girl in the 30s and financed her college education so she could become a school teacher.

Police said the ring to which Miss Staker is accused of belonging fenced thousands of dollars worth of furs, jewels and other goods stolen from major stores in the Bay area.

### Wives Indict Their Husbands

A very brief docket of ten cases was tried on Thursday in Harnett Recorder's Court, the majority of cases stemming from domestic difficulties.

Leonard Henry Hoover, 37-year-old Negro soldier of Ft. Bragg paid ten dollar fine and costs for speeding 66 miles. A second charge of using improper registration plates was dismissed.

Marian Bass, Coats, Route One was acquitted of assault on his wife, and non-support was his wife refused to testify against him. Queenie Oaks, who had indicted her husband, Adam Oaks for non-support, was taxed the costs when the court found her contentions were frivolous and malicious.

Will Monk, 30-year-old Negro of Chalybeate Springs was charged with abandonment and non-support of his two minor children by their mother, Mary V. Knight. The case was dismissed with leave to reopen on payment by Monk of eight dollar weekly payments, beginning Feb. 11.

Dianna Wilkerson, 24, of Lillington, Route 3, a young Negro woman, was found guilty of abandonment of her one year old daughter. She was ordered to pay five dollar a week for the child's care to Moly Wilkerson, Lillington, Route 3.

Charges that W. M. Pearson, 78, of Chalybeate Springs failed to yield right of way and made an improper turn, were dismissed with leave to re-open.

Charges of assault lodged against Terrell Shaw were dismissed. James Thomas, Sanford, Route 7, was acquitted of intent to defraud.

**PROBABLE CAUSE**  
Probable cause of forgery was found against Norman Turpin of Erwin, who was charged with issuing a check in his favor signed by Vance L. Ammons. Knowing it was a forgery, the warrant was signed by Earl F. Ferguson, Turpin was bound over to Superior Court for trial, and his bond was set at \$500.
