One of the cars was ripped in two like a pea pod. Three other cars were knocked off the tracks. Fire Chief Joseph E. Scanlon said 14 bodies were pulled from the wreckage and another body stil remained inside one of the wrecked cars. The bodies were taken to the fire station for identification.

One Train Stopped

Both trains were Boston-bound. One train, composed of four stainless steel Budd cars, was en route from Salem, Mass. The other, a nine-car diesel, was from Portsmouth train was at a standstili when it was rammed in the rear by the Salem train.
