Improvements

Cost of furnishing such a suite will be borne by the county judicial council. Such accommodations were authorized by the new law passed at the last legislature separating the county recorder's court from the superior court and creating a separate clerk for each court. A certain percentage of court costs were set aside for the library.

JAIL NEEDS

Jail accommodations were called to attention of the commissioners by State Jail Inspector T. A. Early from the State Department of Public Welfare which has the responsibility for jail inspections. Early took the commissioners and Sheriff Claude R. Moore on a tour of the jail to point out a long list of ways in which the Harnett jail fails to meet the minimum requirements necessary to absolve the commissioners of liability in event of harm to a prisoner.

UNPROTECTED WINDOWS

Commissioners reported that Early called attention to the fact that there are unprotected glass windows on the lower floor on the prisoner's side of the window. Early told the board it was now easy for an unruly prisoner to break the glass at any time, with possible injury to the prisoner. This condition does not exist on the second floor where there is a cell block. Chief criticisms were reserved for the lack of modern food handling equipment in the kitchen. Harnett's jail in no way conforms, the commissioners were informed, to methods of sterilization recommended for jails.

While no criticism was directed at Jailer L. L. Upchurch and Mrs. Upchurch the inspector pointed out that there is no divided sink in the kitchen such as the State Department of Health requires in all food handling establishments. One section of a sink with water heated to 180 degrees Fahrenheit is needed, he said, to assure dishes clean enough to prevent spread of communicable disease. He also recommended discarding the tin plates from which prisoners now eat for sectioned stainless steel or aluminum trays in order that food will not run together and will appear more appetizing.

COST NOT KNOWN

No estimate was made of the money needed to bring the jail up to state standards, nor was any exact date set for compliance. Inspector Early promised to make his recommendations in writing. "We will think about it," replied the commissioners who frequently eat

at the jail themselves on first Mondays.

Both requests, observed one commissioner, underscored the county's long standing need of a modern courthouse and jail.

In other business, commissioners approved the bond for Constable Bill Manning; granted permission for purchase of electric typewriters for the county health department and for the clerk of superior court. Salary of additional workers assisting Tax Supervisor Berles Johnson was set at one dollar an hour on his recommendation.

Commissioner J. E. Wombie of Lillington reported to the board that the new county library, now under erection in Lillington will cost an exact sum of \$16,619.67.

Chairman L. A. Tart said the Harnett commissioners plan to attend a one day district meeting of the State Association of County Commissioners. The association will meet March 20 at 10 a. m. in Carthage, with representatives from the Institute of Government in charge.

EASTER HOLIDAY

Easter Monday, April 2 was declared a holiday for county employees. The courthouse will be closed, but since the date coincides with First Monday, commissioners will forego the holiday and meet as usual, but at an early hour of 8:30 a. m.

Present in addition to Chairman Tart of Dunn were commissioners R. G. Johnson of Kipling, B. P. Ingram of Marners, and J. E. Wombie of Lillington. Commissioner Bob Pate of Erwin vacationing in Florida was absent. Mrs. Inez Harrington, clerk to the board, and County Attorney W. A. Johnson and Auditor H. D. Carson, Jr. also met with the commissioners.
