Southerners formally laid before Congress today their pledge to use "all lawful means" to upset the Supreme Court's ban on school segregation.

Sen. Waiter F. George (D-Ga.) presented the Southerner's "declaration of constitutional principles" to the Senate on behalf of the 19 Democratic senators who signed it.

#### COURT RULES

WASHINGTON (P) - The Supreme Court today ordered the immediate admission of Virgil D. Hawkins, a Negro, to the University of Florida law school at Gainesville, Fla.

The court acted in a brief unsigned opinion which cited pre-vious decision on the issue of ra-cial segregation in education. Hawkins, 48, has been trying to get into the school for seven years.
