WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower said today he would be very happy to run for re-election with Vice President Richard M. Nixon on the ticket again.

The President at a news conference gave his strongest endorsement to date of the vice president. Summing up his feelings about Nixon "in exactly the terms I mean," the President said: "I am very happy that Dick Nixon is my friend. I am very happy to have him as an associate in government. I would be happy to be on any political ticket in which I was a candidate with him. "Now, if those words aren't plain, then it is merely because people can't understand the plain, unvarnished truth. Then the President emphasized that he would be very happy to have Nixon on any political ticket on which he, the President, was a candidate. His latest comments on Nixon followed on the heels of the heavy write-in vote received by the vice president in yesterday's New Hampshire primary balloting. New Hampshire Gov. Lane Dwinell said that "if the trend continues, it could be interpreted as a mandate" to the GOP convention to renominate Nixon.

PATIENCE FOR SOUTH

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Boyd Facing Judge, Drops Out Of Race

RALEIGH (AP) — Perennial candidate Olla Ray Boyd took himself out of consideration in the race for governor today with a telephoned announcement to the State Board of Elections. The Pinetown pig breeder explained that he is in trouble with the law on the matter of disobeying traffic lights in the town of Winterville. Elections board Secretary R. C. Maxwell said Boyd informed him that he would not file as a candidate for governor as he had previously announced for the reason that he was under criminal indictment in Superior Court of Pitt County on a charge of violating the laws in running through red lights in the town of Winterville. "He feels," Maxwell continued, "that no man should run as a candidate for the high office of governor while he is under indictment for any crime. He stated, however, that he was satisfied that he was not guilty of the charges and that it was all a 'put-up' job."

Car-Owners Who Lack City Tags Court Trouble

Three hundred or more auto tags are waiting at the city hall for those who bought them last year, but somehow haven't appeared as yet for their new tags. Of course, says City Manager A. B. Uzzle, Jr., some of those persons may have sold their cars and become pedestrians or may have left Dunn altogether. On the other hand, he feels quite sure that a percentage simply haven't had the inclination to go to city hall for their tags. This could be costly for them, as police are familiar with the list of those who haven't picked up their tags and watch for their cars. If they don't show up for tags soon, the police may follow out their addresses and check their cars there, said Uzzle. He suggested that car-owners drop in and pick up the tags at city hall. This can be done without penalty. Waiting until police nab a car without the tag can, under the law, bring a fine as high as \$50.

Estes And Dick Win Victory In Hampshire

MANCHESTER, N. H. (AP) — Sen. Estes Kefauver decisively beat Adlai E. Stevenson while Vice President Richard M. Nixon won a thumping vote of confidence yesterday in New Hampshire's first-in-the-nation primary, virtually complete returns showed today.

The vote for Nixon in a spontaneous write-in movement was hailed by a Republican leader as an apparent "mandate" to retain him as President Eisenhower's running mate this year. The President said he'd be "very happy" to have him.

Kefauver captured the 12-man delegation to the Democratic national convention. He defeated Stevenson, who did not personally campaign in this state, by comfortable leads in all the delegate races.

NOT ON BALLOT
The vote for Nixon was considered significant because of reports he might be dumped from the 1956 GOP ticket. His name was not on the ballot.

With all but 13 of the state's 297 towns reporting, Nixon won 21,157 votes, Gov. Christian A. Hooper of Massachusetts 2,831, and Sen. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire 1,827 on the write-in Republican ballot.

In the Republican popularity poll, President Eisenhower received 53,551 votes. He was unopposed. Kefauver, unopposed in the Democratic preferential poll, received 20,343 votes. Stevenson had 3,802 write-ins.

Kefauver said he regarded his vote as "substantial victory" over Stevenson.

In Chicago, Stevenson said he was "surprised and pleased by the large vote" he received.

CIGS SURPLUS
"If the present trend continues," Bond said, "it may be that some changes in price supports and other adjustments will be needed." He reported that already there is enough tobacco in storage to meet a 28 month normal demand. Last year Stabilization had to absorb the largest amount of top quality leaf in its ten year history, he said. Bond urged members of the Stabilization Corporation, a farmer-owned co-op to attend the annual stockholders meeting on June 29 in Raleigh. Harnett farmers present promptly re-elected the members of the present county advisory board as delegates to the meeting. They include R. E. Turlington, Dunn, Route 3; J. A. Darroch, Cameron, Route 2; Ernest Darroch, Lillington, Route 3; I. L. Stevens, Bunneville, Route 1; T. L. Caviness, Pungay Springs, Route 2; Buck Curran, Dunn; McBryde Cameron, Sanford, Route 6; J. E. Womble, Lillington; R. E. Byrd, Erwin, Route 1. Members were told that on May 1 checks, averaging two dollars each, for adjustments on crops grown in the forties, will be mailed to 450,000 N. C. growers. Bond appealed to farmers to keep their addresses current with the Stabilization Corporation, which must keep a daily busy checking addresses of farmers who have moved.

Witness Says Reds Ordered To Aid NAACP

CHARLOTTE, N. C. (AP) — The House Un-American Activities Committee concluded three days of hearings into alleged Communist Party activity in North Carolina today with the indication that some of the "uncooperative witnesses" may be cited for contempt of Congress.

Of the 12 witnesses to testify during the first two days, 10 refused to state whether they had been members of the party. The other witnesses were former FBI undercover men.

Rep. Bernard Kearney (R-N.Y.), said in his opinion some of the uncooperative witnesses probably would be cited for contempt.

Rep. Edwin E. Willic (D-La.), said after yesterday's hearings that testimony leaves the "inescapable conclusion" that Communist agitators have been planted in the South.

EDUCATED WORKERS
"Most of the witnesses possess university degrees, yet what are their ostensible occupations?" said Willic. "Two are sheet metal workers, one is a fish scaler and another a meat clear. Is that what they went to college for?"

"The conclusion is inescapable," he continued. "These men are professional agitators planted in the Southland by Communist conspirators. Who said it couldn't happen here?"

A former FBI undercover man testified today that one of his duties as a Communist Party member in North Carolina was "to aid in the activities" of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Handsome Otis Reavis of Winston-Salem, N. C., whose identity as a counterparty was not revealed until he testified before the House Un-American Activities Committee, said one of the aims of the party was to penetrate the NAACP.

Reavis said that while he was a member of a Communist cell in High Point, he and other "comrades" were sent to an NAACP meeting in Durham.

"We were not part of the organization," he said, "but we were instructed to aid in NAACP activities."

Adlai Says Southern Group Wrong

CHICAGO (AP) — Adlai E. Stevenson said last night that the U. S. Supreme Court is right and a manifesto of Southern lawmakers is wrong on the issue of racial segregation in the schools.

He said he could not agree with the Manifesto's charge that the Supreme Court was guilty of "unwarranted exercise of power" in banning school segregation.

"I think rather that these rulings are correct interpretations of the Constitution and the conscience of the nation," Stevenson said.

HEIRESS PROMISED TO GIVE UP SOCIETY

Brenda Duff Kelly Is Sued For Divorce

BARTOW, Fla. (AP) — John S. (Shipwreck) Kelly has filed suit for divorce from Brenda Duff Frazier Kelly, heiress to a 4-million dollar fortune and the country's No. 1 debutante in 1938.

Kelly, former Kentucky and professional football star, established the required 90-day Florida residence by living at apartments in Miami Beach.

He played golf almost every day while there at the LaGorce Country Club. He now is in Nassau and is expected to stay there until this weekend.

His complaint, filed here, charged Mrs. Kelly with desertion, claiming she left him March 6, 1952 and never returned. They were legally separated in 1952, 11 years after their highly publicized wedding in New York City.

Miss Kelly became the country's top debutante in 1938 at a \$23,350 all-night party at the old Ritz Hotel attended by 1,250 guests who drank \$1,500 worth of champagne and ran up a \$1,000 breakage bill.

At the time of her marriage she said she was giving up cafe society and would live as a housewife on her husband's income as an insurance agent.
