**DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)** — Thieves stole \$125 worth of guests' clothing at a sheriff's ball sponsored by Sheriff Wilbur Hildreth.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Senate has returned the question of revamping the presidential electoral system to committee for more study. Opponents of changing the system said today the Senate's action means the question is a dead issue for the present session of Congress.

**OTTAWA (AP)** — Socialist Claude Ellis, of Regina, Sask., urged Parliament Tuesday to provide more housing while his wife gave birth to twins in an Ottawa hospital.

**FRESNO, Calif. (AP)** — Fresno State College sprint star Mike Agostini, who set a world record in the 220-yard dash earlier this month, will not be able to compete in the Santa Barbara Easter Relays on Saturday because of pain in his right knee.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Congress and the Justice Department are expected to take full advantage now of a 1954 law making it easier for force reluctant witnesses to testify on security matters. The Supreme Court cleared the way for full use of the statute yesterday by ruling 7-2 that it is constitutional.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Sen. James O. Eastland (D-Miss) said today the private papers of the late Harry Dexter White show "the nature of the enemy's apparatus in our midst." Eastland, chairman of the Senate Internal Security subcommittee, made the statement in a forward to a 200-page collection of papers from White's "Blue Berry Hill" summer home at Fitzwilliam, New Hampshire.

**REIDSVILLE (AP)** — The Patriots of North Carolina, Inc., today called Rep. Thurmond Chatham (D-NC) "one of the most uninformed citizens" of the Tar Heel state.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Sen. H. Alexander Smith (R-NJ) urged President Eisenhower to set up a special presidential commission to study effects of the Supreme Court's anti-segregation decision.

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Herman Field returned to the United States Tuesday a most seven years after he sailed for a brief European visit which led to five years of captivity in a Communist cellar in Poland.

**CHARLOTTE, N. C. (AP)** — The American Cotton Manufacturers Institute has scored the U. S. Supreme Court's refusal to review a case affecting the textile industry. The ACMI said the high court's action yesterday gives the secretary of labor unprecedented authority over the American wage structure.

**COLUMBIA, S. C. (AP)** — S. I. Latimer Jr., editor and publisher of The State newspaper here, today assumed duties as commander of the South Carolina department of the American Legion.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Civil rights leaders put machinery in motion today to force a House vote on an omnibus civil rights bill. Rep. Hugh Scott (R-Pa) said there was a "reasonable chance" the bill would be passed.

**WINSTON-SALEM (AP)** — The executive committee of the Wake Forest College board of trustees has given President Harold W. Tribble a full vote of confidence and called for an end to "agitation" against his administration.

**RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP)** — Customs authorities refused to allow the Swedish steamer Montevideo to dock Tuesday because it allegedly brought 208 automobiles from the United States without import licenses.

**TOKYO (AP)** — Japan's Parliament Tuesday approved the biggest national budget in the country's history — expenditures of about \$2.7 billion.

**SEOUL, Korea (AP)** — About 200,000 acres of Korean land has been reclaimed and irrigated under the American aid program to produce rice to feed more than one million persons for a year, a United Nations spokesman said Tuesday.

**UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)** — American delegates invited Israel's Arab Neighbors to ask the United States today to spell out in detail what it wanted U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold to do in the war-threatened Middle East.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Army today appeared to have won at least a temporary victory in its battle with the Air Force for continued expansion of its multi-billion dollar Nike missile system. Still unresolved, however, was the basic question of which — the Army or Air Force — ultimately will have the primary mission of anti-aircraft defense of the United States.

**MOSCOW (AP)** — The official Communist newspaper Pravda denounced Josef Stalin in a 10,000-word editorial today for his "monstrous excesses" during his later years. The bitter attack was the first authoritative report on the present policy of degrading Stalin as outlined by Communist Party Secretary Nikita S. Khrushchev at the recent 20th party congress.

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — Adlai Stevenson arrives here today to map strategy for his "do or die" campaign in the California presidential primary. Stevenson cancelled a Florida vacation to make a 3-day California trip to consult with his campaign heads here amid reports of growing support for Sen. Estes Kefauver.

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Negro ministers in major Northern cities predicted large church attendance of their congregations today in observance of a "national deliverance day of prayer" in sympathy for the Montgomery, Alabama, bus boycott.
