Truman in a speech yesterday accused the President of "betray-al" of the American farmers in his attitude on current farm legis-

The White House press secretary, James C. Hagerty, said, "1 don't believe that Mr. Truman by his own standards can recognize accomplishment when he sees it. Hagerty was speaking on behalf of the President.
