Ike Hits Back At Truman For First Time

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) - President Eisenhower today for the first time in his political career fired back at his predecessor in the White House, former President Truman.

Truman in a speech yesterday accused the President of "betrayal" of the American farmers in his attitude on current farm legislation.

The White House press secretary, James C. Hagerty, said, "I don't believe that Mr. Truman by his own standards can recognize accomplishment when he sees it."

Hagerty was speaking on behalf of the President.

Other developments at the vacation White House here were these: 1. The President will make a major political address from Washington on the evening of April 17, speaking at a gathering of GOP state chairmen and finance committee leaders.

2. The President sent to Congress a supplemental appropriations request for fiscal 1957 of \$19,600,000 for the Small Business Administration and the Defense Department.

3. He planned to confer with Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson before getting on the farm, which passed the House and Senate yesterday in a form counter to the President's ideas on the subject.

4. Ike won't resign. WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson today denied rumors he would resign if President Eisenhower signs the farm bill.

"No, I don't go and sulk in a corner if I don't get everything I want," Benson told the United Press.

"My only object has been to get a bill that will be good for farmers. This is not a good bill."

5. SCOTT RAFS IKE. WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. W. Kerr Scott (D-NC) called on President Eisenhower today to "swallow his pride" and sign the new bill.

No Fires Lit Under Principal Stutts

The remarkable thing about D. T. Stutts, principal of Erwin schools for more than a quarter of a century, has been his ability to stay in one job so long.

School administration posts are noted for their ups and downs, with one year's band of admiring parents being quickly succeeded by a gang of vigilantes.

"We school-folks," frankly remarked Glenn Proffitt, the county superintendent of schools, "get fires built under us quite often."

Nobody ever built a fire under Mr. Stutts.

As the long-time head of a school system which remained the largest in the county until quite recently and even now has a total enrollment of approximately 1200 students, he built a reputation that has stood like a rock.

MOVING TO DURHAM. Only a few days ago it was announced that the Erwin principal had decided to retire and that he and Mrs. Stutts will move to Durham, after the end of the school year, to live in a home they are building there.

The reason for choosing Durham, he said, is because a daughter, Mrs. Ralph Rogers, Jr.—a graduate herself of the Erwin school system—lives there.

Dag Scores On Middle East Peace Mission

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) - The United Nations announced today that Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld has obtained pledges from both Israel and Egypt to refrain from warlike action.

The U. N. released a series of communications between Hammarskjöld and the prime ministers of Israel and Egypt in which the two major belligerent Middle Eastern powers agreed to respect Article II of their general armistice agreement, which bars "warlike or hostile" acts.

Both Egypt and Israel, however, reserved the right to take military action against the other in self defense.

CLOSER TO WAR. JERUSALEM, Israel Sector (AP) - A submachinegun attack by Egyptian commandos on a roomful of praying Israeli children brought the Middle East closer to war today.

The Israel Foreign Office said Egypt had answered U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld's peace appeal with "murder . . . sabotage."

Hammarskjöld now is in Cairo, where he has been talking with Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser and Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzi. U. N. spokesmen said he planned further talks at the Egyptian foreign office Saturday morning before (Continued on Page Six)

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HE GETS A KISSLESS "HELLO" Grace Reunited With Her Prince

MONTE CARLO (AP) - Grace Kelly crossed the sea today into the arms of Prince Rainier III but 30,000 persons who packed the streets of his principality failed to see a royal embrace.

Publicly, at least, it was a kissless hello for the Prince of Monaco and the beautiful actress who is trading her tinsel crown of Hollywood for a golden throne.

When Miss Kelly stepped down the gangway of the liner Constitution onto the royal yacht, carrying her poodle, Oliver, the bashful prince was hiding below decks of his yacht, Deo Juvante II.

Rainier strode out to the gangplank to help her aboard, and he reached out his arms as if to kiss her. But Oliver the poodle apparently came between them and the prince gave Grace something like

an awkward handshake. The smiling actress rushed straight across the deck to his stateroom. There they were reunited in privacy while passengers aboard the Constitution cheered from the rails and the liner saluted them with deep blasts of its horn.

PLANES DROP FLOWERS. Cannon boomed and planes swooped low, dropping white carnations. The flags of the United States and of Monaco snapped in the breeze from poles and from windows across the tiny state.

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Whiskey Arrests On Upgrade

The number of arrests by the Dunn police department went up sharply in March, mostly in the public drunkenness and possession categories.

There was also a warning in figures contained in the quarterly report by the police, that should be heeded by those driving without a license. There were 13 arrests from this cause in March, 2 in February, 6 in January.

Fine and court costs for this offense usually total close to \$40. The only sign that Dunn is becoming more peaceable was in the assaults and affrays column, where the 5 arrests in January and the 11 in February had subsided to only 3 in March. Other calculations:

Public drunkenness - 24 arrests in January, 21 in February, 39 in March. Drunk driving - 8, 5 and 7. Possession of whiskey illegally - 3, 8 and 17. Speeding - 4, 0 and 3. Careless and reckless driving - 3, 3, 4.

Stop sign violation - 0, 1, 0. Non-support - 2, 3, 1. Larceny - 0, 2, 8. Rape - 0, 2, 8. Disorderly conduct - 2, 0, 0. Miscellaneous - 6, 5, 4.

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Presbytery Will Convene In Dunn

Approximately 200 ministers and elders representing the 97 churches in the far-flung Fayetteville Presbytery will gather at the First Presbyterian Church in Dunn Tuesday for the 320th annual stated meeting of the Presbytery.

Plans for the all-day session were announced this morning by the Rev. Leslie C. Tucker, Jr., pastor of the host church. It will be the first time in recent years that

the Presbytery has held its meeting in Dunn and one of the few times in history.

Dr. Robert G. Hall, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Red Springs, is moderator and will preside.

OUTSTANDING PROGRAM. The day's program will include addresses by prominent Presbyterian ministers and laymen, reception of new ministers into the Presbytery, reports on various phases of church activity in the Presbytery, a memorial service and election of new officers.

The Presbytery comprises most of the churches in southeastern and central Carolina.

Annual reports on Christian Higher Education, Christian Education and Church Extension will be presented during the business session.

Sermons will be delivered by four ministerial candidates, Z. T. Piephoff of Laurinburg, Sam-

Four County Board Members Opposed

Every member of the present county board of commissioners except Chairman L. A. Tart of Dunn has strong opposition in the May 26 primaries.

Alex Cameron of Sanford, Route 6, filed late yesterday in District 5, assuring a race with the incumbent, B. P. Ongrath of Marners. Cameron is a past president of the Harnett County farm bureau and an active member of the Barbecue Presbyterian Church. He lives in Barbecue township.

Ingram, the incumbent, resides in Upper Little River township. He represents one of the largest districts of the county. It is composed of Upper Little River townships one and two, Johnsonville town-

ship and Barbecue township. Board member R. Glenn Johnson of Kipling also filed today to represent District 3. Johnson already has strong opposition with the filing of Joe Curran, Angier tobaccoist.

Nell's Creek, Hector's Creek, Buckhorn and Black River townships make up this district.

Already there is a three-way race for the seat on the board now held by Bob Pate of Erwin in District No. 2. The contestants are Jarvis Pleasant, Coy Lucas and Joe Denning, all of whom announced their candidacy previously. District 2 is made up of Duke, and Grove townships, which in-

MRS. HARRINGTON ANNOUNCES FOR OFFICE

Winner Ten Times, She'll Run Again

Mrs. Inez Harrington, a school teacher in Western Harnett from 1921 to 1925, has been register of deeds long enough (since 1936) to see many of her former students become husbands, wives and parents.

She announced today - once again - for the 11th time - she will run for the office which she has held since her appointment to fill her husband's unexpired term.

Her husband, Edwin Harrington, was almost ready to announce his candidacy when he died in 1936. Mrs. Harrington took over in the face of the campaign, successfully won her way to office. Over the years, she has been a consistent winner, often leading the ticket. In point of service, she is the most experienced of county office-holders.

In 1953, the last previous election in which she was entered, she led her opponent Frank Lewis two - to - one, gathering more votes than any other county official who made the race.

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Judge Strickland Intends To File

Judge H. Paul Strickland announced this morning that today or Friday he will pay the filing fee and stand as a nominee for reelection.

The judge of Recorder's Court in Dunn, he is now finishing the second of two four-year terms to which he was elected.

No other local attorney is known to be seeking the office which Judge Strickland now holds. Dunn Attorney Max McLeod, rumored to be a possible candidate, announced a few days ago that he will not run.

Judge Strickland is well-known in this area, not only for his distinguished career as a lawyer and judge, but for his prominence in affairs of the Baptist.

He is moderator of the Little River Baptist Association, which is comprised of many congregations in this area.
