Russia Denies UN Delegate Abused Rights

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Russia denied today that Adkady A. Sobolev, chief Soviet delegate to the United Nations, or any of his aides abuse their diplomatic privilege in arranging the return of five defecting Soviet sailors to their homeland.

Sen. William E. Jenner (R-Ind.) demanded in Washington that the United States oust Sobolev for his part in the "political kidnapping" of the Russian seamen. The sailors had sought asylum in this country after their vessel was captured by Chinese Nationalists.

Lillington To Get New Water System

Everything is in readiness in Lillington to begin work on what Mayor Pro-Temp S. G. Howell of the Town Board today called the "most forward looking step taken in 25 years — construction of a new water system."

Mayor H. H. Hamilton and the board of commissioners are advertising for bids from contractors and materialmen to furnish labor and material to build a new water system which will use the Cape Fear River as source of water instead of the five deep wells formerly serving Lillington.

SHIFT IN POSITION

LONDON (AP)—The Soviet Union suddenly shifted its position today and announced it is ready to discuss nuclear disarmament as well as conventional arms cuts.

The switch was announced by Andrei Gromyko, Moscow's chief delegate to the current five-power United Nations disarmament talks.

Gromyko told the conference this morning that the Soviet may amend its proposal to cut only conventional weapons, and include nuclear arms reductions as well.

Many Sentenced In Dunn Court

In Dunn Court today, Abron McNeill was fined for disorderly conduct and the state didn't prosecute him on a charge of "forceable trespass."

McNeill baffled officers by turning up at the Virginia - Carolina Chemical Fertilizer Co. just forty minutes after he had headed home from the police station in a taxi.

The disorderly conduct charge was brought by theater manager James Yeats. McNeill was given 60 days on the roads, suspended on condition that he pay a \$10 fine and court costs.

New Jail Sentence For Lady Mae Poe

Lady Mae Poe, who gets herself in trouble real regular, had two new sentences of six months each hanging over her head this morning at the conclusion of a trial on two different counts of larceny.

She was found guilty in Dunn Recorder's Court of stealing some fish boxes, valued at \$3, from the "Ideal Grocery," which is run by Otis S. Jackson.

And she was also convicted of stealing some garden tools, valued at \$20, from Jesse Williams.

Lady Mae didn't admit any of this, and she isn't resigned to serving her sentence either—even though Judge H. Paul Strickland ruled that she could serve the two terms of six months each concurrently (so free, that is, at the end of six months).

7 Children Die In Fire; Father Held

ERIE, Mich. (AP)—Seven small children left unattended died in a fire at their home near the Michigan and Ohio state line in Monroe County, Mich., early today, state police said.

Police said the children of John and Laura Cooper burned to death in the blaze of undetermined origin while Cooper took his wife to work at a restaurant in Toledo, Ohio, seven miles away.

Victims were Brenda Joyce, 9; Harrison Leonard, 9; Jacqueline May, 5; John Jr., 4; Shirley Jean, 2; Georgia Marie, 1, and Carter Steven, two months.

All but Harrison Leonard were children of the Coopers but he was being reared as a Cooper following the death of his mother, who was Mrs. Cooper's sister.

Cooper, 33, told police he took his 29-year old wife to work shortly before 10 p. m. and intended to return home immediately. The fire (Continued On Page Two)

Edward Arnold Dies Suddenly

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Edward Arnold, massive actor whose parts ranged from presidents to mob leaders, died at his home today of a cerebral hemorrhage.

He was 66, and was in his 50th year in show business.

He was the star of the "Mr. President" series on radio and television, but for decades was best known to movie-goers as the big man in faultlessly tailored suits who might turn out to be either the villain or the tycoon with the heart of gold.

Two Arrested In Goldston Break-Ins

PITTSBORO, N. C. (AP)—Robert E. Green and Hosea Parker, both of Warsaw, N. C., were held here today pending federal court trial on a charge of attempted bank robbery.

The two also face trial in state courts on five charges of attempting to rob business establishments at Goldston. They were arrested after the attempted break-ins were discovered early Tuesday morning at Goldston.

After a preliminary hearing yesterday before U. S. Commissioner Henry Bane at Durham, they were found over for trial at the September term of federal court at Durham. Bond for Parker was set at \$10,000 and for Green at \$3,500. Chatham County Sheriff J. W. Emerson Jr. said the attempted robberies were discovered when a newspaper carrier found the doors of several business places standing open.

Chiropractors Meet In Dunn

Dr. John L. Frizzelle, state president of the Chiropractic Association of North Carolina, Dr. Ivan Richards, vice-president, and Dr. J. B. Morris, state chairman of the posture committee, picked this pair from other competitors for their superiority in 14 specific traits.

Congress Expected To Reject Farm Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)— Republican leaders said today the administration will oppose and Congress will reject a new Democratic farm plan for direct subsidy payments to farmers.

Rep. Charles A. Halleck (R-Ind.) said the plan "hasn't got a chance" of winning congressional approval. GOP Whip Leslie C. Arends said it represents a "desperate attempt" by Democrats to delay action on the administration's \$1,200,000,000 soil bank proposal. Arends said the Democratic proposal is a "glorified version of the Brannan plan."

Halleck also told newsmen that any new farm bill would be "certain to be vetoed" again by President Eisenhower if Congress "again loads it up to the point where it is unacceptable."

VOTE NEXT WEEK

Farmers could receive as much as 500 million dollars in government checks this year under the new Democratic plan. The proposal is scheduled for a vote in the House Agricultural Committee next week.

Ex-Convict Admits Slaying Teacher

MUNISING, Mich. (AP)—A surly ex-convict confessed the murder of a pretty, 21-year old school teacher and led police to her body shortly before midnight Wednesday.

Police said Leonard H. Lundberg, 35, a parolee, broke down after 12 hours of questioning and showed them the hideous body of Patricia Burdick only three miles from where she hitchhiked a ride with him Sunday night.

The petite brown-haired woman's body was lying under a clump of jackpines as was covered with straw and branches. Blood spotted her tan slacks and red coat and her skull was crushed, police said.

An autopsy was ordered today to learn whether the girl was sexually assaulted. Authorities said assault apparently was the motive for the slaying.

Lundberg would give no motive, police said. He admitted picking up Miss Burdick at an intersection near Seney, Mich., 27 miles south of Grand Marais where she (Continued On Page Two)
