The report was filed from here yesterday. He planned to wind up his successful peace mission to the Middle East today with a series of conference designed to wrap up loose ends. He is expected back ir New York this weekend.

Hammarskjold came to the Middle East April 6 under a Security Council resolution directing him to make a personaal survey of how well each side had complied with the 1949 armistice agreement which ended the Palestine war.
