**MADISON, Wis. (AP)** — Veteran Sen. Alexander Wiley set out today to win a fourth term in the face of a party revolt and the surprise candidacy of a young congressman who has never been beaten. The 72-year-old Republican camp back fighting after the state GOP convention, in a dramatic turn-about, refused to endorse him for re-nomination in Milwaukee Saturday.

**CHAPEL HILL (AP)** — The trustees of the Consolidated University of North Carolina accepted the resignation of Dr. Edward Kidder Graham as chancellor of Woman's College. The resignation came as the trustees received a report on an investigation or reported "differences" between the faculty and administration of the college.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Supreme Court yesterday left standing a lower court decision that workers joining a labor union may be fired under union shop contracts. The case was appealed by two Los Angeles railroad workers who are members of the Plymouth Brethren religious sect. They claimed that their constitutional freedom of religion was violated by the union shop contracts permitted under the Railway Labor Act.

**NEW ORLEANS (AP)** — Presidential hopeful Adlai Stevenson said here today he would follow whatever civil rights policy the platform committee of the Democratic Party adopts.

**ALGIERS (AP)** — French authorities announced today they were holding for questioning 522 of the 4,480 rebel suspects they picked up Sunday in a gigantic raid on the Casbah.

**KHATMANDU, Nepal (AP)** — A band of Swiss mountaineers climbed to the top of Mt. Everest twice last week for the first double conquest of the world's highest mountain, a message to the Swiss legation here reported today.

**RALEIGH (AP)** — Duke University sprinter Dave Sims today was named the Atlantic Coast Conference athlete of the year. The red-haired sophomore from Fairlawn, N. J., was a runaway choice in voting conducted by the Atlantic Coast Sports Writers Assn.

**PARIS (AP)** — The 15 North Atlantic Treaty countries would defend themselves "fast" against a Russian surprise attack without waiting for the unanimous permission of their governments, NATO Secretary-General Lord Ismay said today.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash) introduced a bill Monday to set up a bureau of older persons in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The bill, similar to one introduced earlier in the House, would make grants to states to handle the problems of persons aged 65 and older.

**MOLINE, Ill. (AP)** — Negotiators Monday night announced an agreement had been reached to end the 134-day strike against John Deere and Co. farm implement firm. Terms of the settlement, subject to approval by 4,100 UAW members, were not revealed.

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — Television actress Joan Manning, 27, daughter of radio's Vera Vague, will marry Atty. Robert J. Gottlieb, 36, tonight at Hollywood's First Presbyterian Church.

**EVANSVILLE, Ind. (AP)** — Poison cyanide gas touched off an explosion at the Mead Johnson plant Monday night, injuring three firemen and two other persons.

**GUATEMALA CITY (AP)** — The Pan American highway link between northern Guatemala and the Mexican border is expected to be completed by the time the Inter-American Road Congress meets here Nov. 25-30.

**SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)** — American Ambassador Willard L. Beulac, who served here three years, left Monday for his new post in Argentina.

**GUNTERSVILLE, Ala. (AP)** — Odell Long was jailed for reckless driving Monday after his cabin cruiser ran out of control, plowed onto a causeway and collided with an automobile.

**QUITO, Ecuador (AP)** — The Supreme Electoral Tribunal said today Equadoreans will be "frozen" in their home districts during Sunday's presidential election in an effort to prevent repeat voting.

**NEW YORK (AP)** — A pigeon annoyed by the new electric birdproofing on city hall went amok Monday in a restaurant across the street. Before it could be caught, the pigeon went on a nut binge, gobbling up peanuts, pecans, cashews, and walnuts on display in the window.

**PASADENA, Calif. (AP)** — Owners of a machine shop were shocked today over loss of a "valuable piece of art." They entered the shop Sunday night and carried off a Marilyn Monroe calendar.

**LANSING, Mich. (AP)** — A deer dashed into a clothing store here Monday, charged its own reflection in two mirrors, smashed the mirrors, caved in a wall, and cut its nose before fleeing the shop.

**RALEIGH (AP)** — Seaboard Air Line Railroad has disclosed plans to transport express goods by motor vehicle rather than by train over routes in North Carolina.

**UNITED NATIONS (AP)** — The Syrian delegation to the United Nations lined up Arab opposition today to a British resolution asking the Security Council to commend Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold for his Middle East peace efforts.

**PITTSBURGH (AP)** — The United Steelworkers Union and the steel industry pitched into full bargaining today to find a settlement for sweeping contract demands for the union's 650,000 members employed in the nation's basic steel industry.

**RALEIGH (AP)** — Fifteen persons were killed in traffic accidents over the long Memorial Day weekend in North Carolina last year.

of weapons and the development of military propulsion reactors.

White House press secretary James C. Hagerty said some funds also would be used "on an accelerated program" in the development of civilian atomic power reactors.

He said funds also are being sought for plant acquisition and construction needed to provide additional facilities for the expanded military and civilian reactor program.

The money is required so the United States can take advantage of the "recent technological advances in the military part of the program," Hagerty added. This could refer to recent tests in the Pacific.
