Red Military Bid To U. S. Is Accepted

WASHINGTON (AP) - Gen. Nathan F. Twining, Air Force chief of staff, today accepted an invitation to attend the Soviet Air show at Moscow on June 24. Twining accepted the invitation upon the authorization of President Eisenhower.

Later, White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said Mr. Eisenhower gave his consent to the trip yesterday.

Asked whether his government was prepared to invite top commanders of the Russian Air Force to this country Hagerty said, "I don't know of any invitation."

Secretary of the Air Force Donald A. Quarles announced the acceptance. Quarles said the invitation also was approved by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson.

Twining will be accompanied to Moscow by several Air Force officers of his own choosing.

The invitation was tendered by Col. Philip Backinsky, air attache at the Soviet embassy, Bachinsky called at the foreign liaison office in the Pentagon Monday with a formal invitation. Later yesterday he "called again, this time at Twining's office to deliver a personal invitation. At the time, Twining told him it would receive "serious consideration and an early reply."

Quarles made the announcement shortly after he and Wilson called upon Mr. Eisenhower at the White House.

ADLAI EDGES TO SMALL WIN

Kefauver Claims "Moral Victory"

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) - Adlai E. Stevenson won 22 of Florida's 28 Democratic national convention votes in a dramatic battle with Sen. Estes Kefauver, returns from the state's popularity contest showed today. Reports from 1,742 of Florida's 1,779 precincts gave Stevenson 221, 533 votes and Kefauver 209,531. In the light Republican vote, President Eisenhower smothered his only rival, Sen. William F. Knowland of California, whose name had been entered in the primary before the President announced he would seek another term. Knowland de-

SECOND PRIMARY PENDING

Ross And Byrd Uudecided

Beaten by several hundred votes in the primaries by youthful Charles Williams, Erwin Attorney, Harnett Court Solicitor Neill McKay Ross said today that he has not decided whether to contest the results in a second primary. Another possible run-off continued to hang fire today as Worth Lee Byrd, runner-up in the race for commissioner of District Four (100 votes separated him from incumbent J. E. Womble), stated he had reached no decision

Action Taken After 13 Hours Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate, worn out after 13 solid hours of debate, early today passed a \$37 billion bill authorizing the biggest highway program in the nation's history.

The bill, passed by voice vote at 12:15 a. m. EDT today, now goes to a House-Senate conference committee to iron out differences between the Senate measure and the bill passed earlier by the House.

Sen. Albert Gore (D-Tenn., chief sponsor of the long-range Senate bill, predicted the joint committee would put together the best features of both bills. The House bill carries a \$51.5 billion price tag.

LINK MAJOR CITIES

The chief difference to be worked out on conference is the method of distributing to the states some \$35 billion proposed in both bills for an interstate network of super-highways. The modern highways would link most state capitols and the nation's major cities. Both the House and Senate versions agreed substantially on boosts in gasoline, tire, truck and other highway user taxes to foot part of the road bill's cost. The tax increases would cost the average motorist about \$8.80 per year.

The bill calls for a 13-year construction program. But the Senate added an amendment which could stretch it out to 16 years. The amendment, sought by Secretary of the Treasury George M. Humphrey, would keep the construction program strictly on a pay-as-you-go basis by barring federal allotments in excess of available funds during any one year.

In an unusual parliamentary snarl, the Senate approved two flatly conflicting amendments.

NIXON BREAKS TIE

It first voted 40-39, with Vice President Richard M. Nixon breaking the tie, to let state highway departments determine "prevailing wages" for road workers. Then it approved 42-37 a rival amendment which would require the secretary of labor to determine prevailing wage rates after consultation with state officials.

The Senate, after a hard-fought scrap, finally went along with a House provision requiring contractors to pay no less than the prevailing wage in their locality, as determined by the labor secretary. However, it added an amendment providing for appeal to the courts from the secretary's findings.

The Senate voted to allocate the \$25 billion for the interstate network on the basis of states' population, size and RFD mileage - with the population factor counting one-third, and size and mileage two-thirds each. It rejected the House formula basing allotments on states' estimated needs.

TRAFFIC VIOLATORS FINED IN HARNETT

Harnett Recorder's court faced a small docket last week because of the May term of Superior Court being held in the courthouse. Convictions of driving without a license were returned against three defendants - Betty Lou Gray, Samuel McEachin, Jr., and Neille McLean. Each was fined \$25 and costs. However, the fine against Neille McLean was remitted.

Hubert Benton Harmon and Garfield Roosevelt Douglas were taxed with the court cost after being convicted of public drunkenness. Other cases in Recorder's court: Hervest Jacobs, driving without a license, judgment continued on payment of costs; Leslie William Lawrence, speeding 65 mph, judgment continued on payment of \$5 fine and costs; Alexander Collins, failing to wear glasses while driving, judgment continued on pay-

DUNN NATIVE SPEAKS Warren Convenes Baptist Meeting

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - C. C. Warren, president of the Southern Baptist Convention, opened the 1956 convention today with a plea for "the courage, prudence, patience and understanding" called for by President Eisenhower for solution of the problem of racial desegregation.

Warren, of Charlotte, N. C., told the Baptists that the Supreme Court decision on integration has "become the most disturbing issue in many parts of our Southland."

"I concur in the feeling that it will be unwise for us to reopen any discussion of it here," said Warren. "It may be well for us to remember, however, that extremists and agitators have, and will perhaps continue to do, incalculable harm.

"Those who follow such a course overlook the fact that economic and social relationships which have been from one to three hun-

dred years in the making, simply cannot be changed overnight. WARNS OF DEFIANCE "On the other hand, open defiance of the Constitutional principle will endanger our foreign mission work throughout 35 areas of the earth and play right into the hands of the Communists, who will welcome the privilege of ridiculing, not only our democratic form of government, but the type of Christianity which seeks to win the world."

Warren called on the Baptists to "humble ourselves before God and realize afresh that Christian

SCHOOL OF BEAUTY CULTURE OPENS Hank's College Now Underway

The Dunn College of Beauty Culture, newest school of its kind in the state, started a batch of students off among the shampoo bowls and facial couches at nine o'clock Tuesday morning. Hank Hanna, the wife of Dunn's mayor and fire chief and an operator with 25 years experience, is the owner - operator - instructor who will guide this first class through 1000 hours of study. By Saturday, she expects to have a dozen students enrolled, and more will be accepted in weeks to come. The College of Beauty Culture, where the training is conducted, is located right next door to the much-frequented "Hank's Beauty Salon" in downtown Dunn.

NOT ALL BEGINNERS Not all of this first crop are beginners. Mrs. Hanna says she has some advanced students who have transferred from other schools. High School Commencement Exercises, most of which are taking place this week, will also yield some students who plan to shift from one kind of school to the other. The new college has enough shampoo chairs, dressettes, manicuring tables, dryers and other paraphernalia of the trade to keep a large number of students busy. Starting next week, the fledgling operators will work on live subjects. Mrs. Hanna said that only materials would be put on the bill of persons who let the beginners work on them. Advanced students will work on customers for half the usual beauty salon prices.

HAS AIR-CONDITIONING

The college is decorated in gray and coral and Mrs. Hanna declares, "I do know we've got the prettiest school in the state. It's air-conditioned, too." Next week, Hank's instructor (and fellow operator) Margie Glover will be in charge while Mrs. Hanna herself will attend a meeting of the North Carolina State Board of Cosmetic Arts. This is the agency which licenses beauty operators who have put in their 1000 hours training time. Although she will finish out her current term on the board, Mrs. Hanna will not be reappointed because she would not be allowed to examine her own students who, in six months or so, will be coming before the board for licensing.
