NEW YORK (AP) — America's steel industry and the 650,000 men who make the steel so basic to our economic life negotiated amiably again today to see which side gets a half billion dollar plum for a prize.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower has opened the way to a series of high-level visits between U.S. and Soviet officials if the Russians want them. Indications are the Soviet bosses would like nothing better. The result could be eventual visits to the United States by Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov, Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Communist Party boss Nikita Khrushchev.

FANMUNJOM, Korea (AP) — The neutral nations truce inspection teams have bowed to a demand by the United Nations command that they get out of the Republic of Korea, it was announced today.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower made a quick round trip to his Gettysburg, Pa. farm Wednesday and conferred with two Aberdeen Angus cattle breeders.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Adlai E. Stevenson's supporters cited his California triumph today as a conclusive answer to the he-can't-win-argument raised against him by Democratic opponents.

MOSCOW (AP) — Marshal Tito shrugged off as "not important" Wednesday night a congressional move to cut U. S. aid to Yugoslavia and hinted he would like to visit Washington.

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Vice Adm. Charles Turner Joy, 61, chief U.N. delegate to the Korean truce conference, died Wednesday of leukemia at the San Diego Naval Hospital.

The soft-spoken admiral had been ill since he retired two years ago, from active duty and last Monday entered the hospital in a final attempt to defeat the incurable disease.

LONDON (AP) — Scotland Yard detectives raided the homes of Greeks living in London in their hunt for Cypriot gunmetal plotting death to British officials, it was reported today. The report coincided with a new Labor Party demand that Sir John Harding resign as governor of Cyprus.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House has passed and sent to the Senate a bill to repay Pope Pius XII \$964,199 for World War II bombing damage to the Vatican's Castel Gandolfo, the Pope's summer residence.

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Princess Margaret of Britain arrives here Monday with Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh and already there were whispers of a possible royal romance.

MONTREAT, N. C. (AP) — Delegates to the 96th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the U. S., returned to their churches throughout the Southland today with the pressing problem of racial segregation postponed for another year.

RALEIGH (AP) — A new court ruling further establishes authority of the State Highway Commission to condemn property for use on limited access highways.

LONDON (AP) — Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin said today he believes there is no longer a possibility of war.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Ila Mitchell Jr., a postman, was found guilty of contempt of court for wearing his uniform hat into a courtroom while delivering mail. Superior Judge John L. Niblack gave Mitchell a suspended sentence and told him to inform fellow postmen they'd better bare their heads hereafter when entering his court.

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Gov. Thomas B. Stanley announced today he will call a special session of the General Assembly within 90 days to consider laws designed to insure continued segregation of Virginia schools.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Marine Corps said today that enlistments dropped in April, due in "some degree" to the drowning of six recruits at Parris Island, S. C.

MONTGOMERY (AP) — Circuit Judge Eugene Carter today formally sentenced Mrs. Rhonda Bell Martin, 49, convicted poisoner of her husband, to death in the electric chair. He set the date of execution for Friday, July 13.

LONDON (AP) — Britain announced today it will explode its first hydrogen bomb next year. The decision was announced by Prime Minister Anthony Eden in a statement to the House of Commons.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The AFL-CIO moved today to carry out its pledge to investigate union racketeering. President Eisenhower promised government help if it is wanted.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Older houses are selling as well or better than a year ago in most areas of the country, but the number of areas where sales are down is getting bigger, according to a real estate survey of 220 points across the country.
