Heavily-Cut Foreign Aid Bill Passes

WASHINGTON (IP) - The House overwhelmingly passed heavily-slashed \$3,800, 000,000 foreign aid bill today despite President Eisenhower's warning that it would "seriously impair" U.S. security.

The measure, which now goes to the Senate, was approved by a rollcall vote of 273 to 122. The House acted after rejecting, 147 to 52, an attempt by Rep. -Lawrence H. Smith (R-Wis.) to send the bill back to the House Foreign Affairs Committee for further study.

WAIT SENATE ACTION The administration is counting on the Senate to restore at least part of the \$1,100,000,000 slashed from Mr. Eisenhower's original \$4,900,000,000 request by the House

Foreign Affairs Committee.

The House sustained the committee despite a series of warnings by Mr. Eisenhower and his top military and diplomatic advisers that such action would imperil the safety of the free world and the future of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

President Takes 40-Foot Stroll On Doctor's Arm

WASHINGTON (IP) - President Eisenhower walked 40 feet in his hospital room today "and has resumed a light schedule of duties,' press secretary James C. Hagerty announced.

Hagerty said the President conferred this morning with presidential assistant Sherman Adams for about 10 minutes and decided several matters.

He said the President, who walked 30 feet Sunday with two attendants supporting his elbows, walked 40 feet today. Dr. Isidor Ravdin, a member of the operating team who performed the operation Saturday morning, supported "just slightly."

He said the President experienced some pain during his walk but less than on his first attempt. After the walk, Hagerty said Adams arrived with other White House staff members. They conferred in the lounge of the presidential suite with Dr. Raydin, Maj. Gen. Leonard D. Heaton, who performed the actual surgery and Maj. Gen. Howard McC. Snyder, the President's personal physician.
