## **Truman Aides** Convicted Of Fix Charge

ST. LOUIS (P) - Two high Truman administration officials were convicted today of charges of conspiracy to defraud the government in the handling of a tax case.

A jury of eight men and four women deliberated nine hours and five minutes before reaching its

Judge Rubey M. Hulen announced after the verdict was read he would sentence Matthew J. Connelly, White House aide to former President Truman, and T. Lamar Caudle, former head of the Justice Department's tax division, on July 19.

Conviction carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. The judge could order a lesser penalty.
